

Mr. Paul Nielsen, principal and district superintendent, is a native of Denmark. He came to this country at the age of eight. Upon graduating from high school in Ann Arbor, Michigan, in 1936, he continued his education at the University of Michigan where he received the B.A. degree. Later, at the University of Southern California, he received a master's degree in education, and this year he completed the requirements for a doctorate in education at the same university.

Mr. Nielsen served in the United States Navy four and one-half years.

Vice-principal Einar Peterson has been teaching mathematics at Kingsburg High School for thirty years. Only when he served as an officer in the United States Army Air Forces was his teaching interrupted.

Mr. Peterson was a member of the graduating class at Kingsburg High School in 1916. He later received his A.B. degree from the University of California.

Although he was born in Chicago, Illinois, Mr. Peterson has lived in Kingsburg since 1905.

Mr. Gordon Satterberg, president and a board member for the past six years, is the owner and proprietor of the Model Drug.


The vice-president of the board, Mr. James Cassidy, has been a member since 1951. Mr. Cassidy states that his occupation is ranching.





Working behind the scenes, the campus employees of Kingsburg High School have enjoyed a busy year.


The cooks, Alice Meteer, Ercell Rold, and Tina Strid, proved of vital importance as they daily prepared delicious lunches for the students.

Completing 35 years of service, Mr. George Henderson, school auditor, has spent his final year grappling with the student body and school district finances.








A friendly spirit of cooperation, good sportsmanship, and a better understanding of sports are the goals of the Girls' Athletic Association.

### viking voice


Gathering pertinent news around the campus and compiling it into readable facts was the job of the eleven valiant members of the Viking Voice staff.





of Kingsburg jointly sponsored a banquet in honor of the football squads.







The team also competed in the Wasco Relays and the Fresno Relay carnival, and was represented in the West Coast Relays.




