Mr. Paul Nielsen, principal and district superintendent, is a native of Denmark. He came to this country at the age of eight. Upon graduating from high school in Ann Arbor, Michigan, in 1936, he continued his education at the University of Michigan where he received the B.A. degree. Later, at the University of Southern California, he received a master's degree in education, and this year he completed the requirements for a doctorate in education at the same university.

Mr. Nielsen served in the United States Navy four and one-half years.

Vice-principal Einar Peterson has been teaching mathematics at Kingsburg High School for thirty years. Only when he served as an officer in the United States Army Air Forces was his teaching interrupted.

Mr. Peterson was a member of ihe graduating class at Kingsburg High School in 1916. He later received his A.B. degree from the University of California.

Although he was born in Chicago, Illinois, Mr. Peterson has lived in Kingsburg since 1905 .
