




Our scientists over the years through their patient study and research have harnessed the atom; hence Atomic Power. The age in which we live could therefore well be called the Atomic Age.

The assembly committee, appointed by the vice-president, planned and presented quite a number of entertaining programs to the students.


Student Council members met every Wednesday at noon to decide on all important matters of student government.





A student band, named the "Combo Band," played for most of the dances. At other times records and other bands were used.






The Kingsburg Hi-Y Club had one of the largest memberships in recent years and enjoyed many good times together in addition to their many worthwhile projects.





The annual Spring Day Dance was held in the gaily decorated gym and there were also games going on in the other half of the gym.





The lone victory of the league for the local middleweights was against Washington Union, 46 to 44, in an overtime game. Many games the B team went down to defeat by the meagerist of margins.



The junior varsity club was made up mostly of lowerclassmen or newcomers to the sport, and these boys compiled a fine record in addition to absorbing the experience their division offers.



The winged feet of the Viking track team started off to a successful season. The team took top honors on their first meet, which was held in the KHS bowl on March 23.


Coach Murl Dodson has had good first-class material to work with.






