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

Our years in high school are spent not only in making a good record, but also in having all the good times available.





STUDENT COUNCIL

The council is the student-governing body of our school. All business concerning the student body as a whole is carried on there. To look out for the best interests of the school is one of the jobs of the council, whose main objective is to improve the school. School spirit is stimulated through the pep rallies and the exchange assemblies.

President Tok Fukuda, who presided over all student council meetings, ably led the students through a successful year.

Some of the projects carried on by the council during the school term were the sponsoring of a successful dance and a clean-up campaign, and the improving of conduct at pep rallies and assemblies.

Representatives were sent by the council to all district meetings of the California Association of Student Councils, where the opinions of high school students may be known through this larger organization and where the delegates have a chance to learn of other schools and their student councils.

The KHS student council, together with the other high school councils in the San Joaquin Valley, belongs to the Associated Student Councils of America.



Other fund-raising projects were several bake sales and a car wash held in the spring.


Marshaling the dramatic talents of the class, the seniors presented the play "Father's Been To Mars."






Next year's junior class has been busy this year with money-raising projects in order to finance their junior-senior banquet next year.


FRESHMEN





The journalistically inclined students met only one period of the day, during which they worked on both the paper and the yearbook.


At the start of the year, a great deal of effort was put forth by Mr. Scott, adviser, and his staff in teaching the new reporters the fundamental steps necessary in writing.



C.S.F.

In order to qualify for membership in C.S.F., all students must have ten points. In a solid subject, A's count three points and one and one half points in a nonsolid subject. B's in a solid count one point and one half for a nonsolid. Only semester grades are counted toward the points.

Seniors may become life members, sealbearers, of the C.S.F. if they have been members for four semesters with one semester during the senior year. A graduate receives a gold seal on his diploma if he has belonged four semesters during the last three years.

Records of the graduates who were members of C.S.F. at the time of graduation from 1924 to 1957 are kept on file at Kingsburg High School.



The magnificent Vikings dropped one practice game to Reedley, a heartbreaker for the team, but they returned the next week end to defeat Dinuba 32 to 20.



On the evening of March I, the team was entertained at Bruce's Lodge with an after-game dinner.





The B-Class basketball team, under the coaching of Charles Moore, finished the 1956-57 season with a record of eleven wins against only three defeats.



The team was strengthened by many returning lettermen in the sprints and longer distances, the jumps, and the weights.







Beginning with practice in the fall, the KHS tennis team completed a successful season. To test its ability before entering league competition, the team participated in five practice matches.


Under the able coaching of Miss Janet Dunn, the seven returning lettermen assisted by many new team members were able to build one of the strongest teams in the league.

A harvest-moon dance was sponsored by the freshmen, and the juniors were hosts to the Christmas Ball during the holiday season.


The G.A.A. sponsored the Mid-Winter Ball during which a queen was crowned.


