## BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees are five of the hardest-working citizens of Kingsburg, whose efforts are seldom fully appreciaied.

The position of trustee is one of public trust and great responsibility. Board members are not selected on a political basis but on a basis of merit, and each member of the board is an officer of the state of California. All of the KHS Trustees have, or have had, children in the Kingsburg schools.

Board members have spent considerable effort on the building plans which are being corried out in 1958. Becouse of the pressing need of this program, the Board has met twice a month instead of once at the usual meeting on the second Mondary of each month.

The function of the Board is to make policies for the KHS district. These policies are carried out by the employees. A sign in Principal Nielsen's office reads: "'The secret of success is doing what you have to do better than you have to do it." This motto could very well exemplify the work of the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Paul Nielsen, district superintendent and principal, is a native of Denmark. Since 1946 he has been an educator in Colorado, Washington and California. He received the degrees of Master of Education and Doctor of Education from the University of Southern California.

This year Dr. Nielsen was instrumental in bringing about the California Association of Secondary School Administration self-evaluation program at KHS. Four school committees compiled a report which was sent to a visiting committee, who came to the school in April to make the final evaluation.

## SENIORS
