Our years in high school are spent not only in making a good record, but also in having all the good times available.

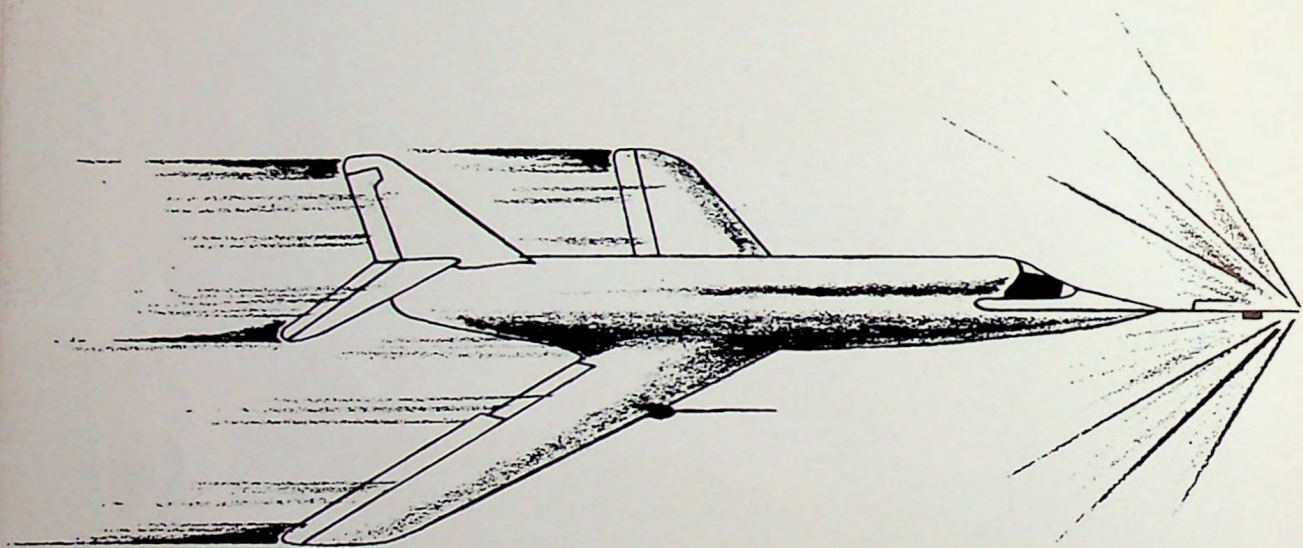

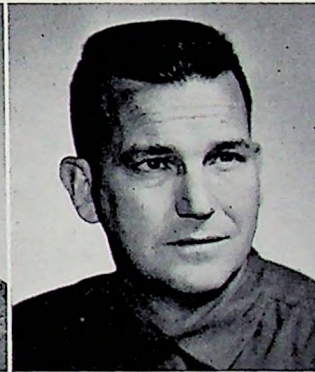

## STUDENT COUNCIL

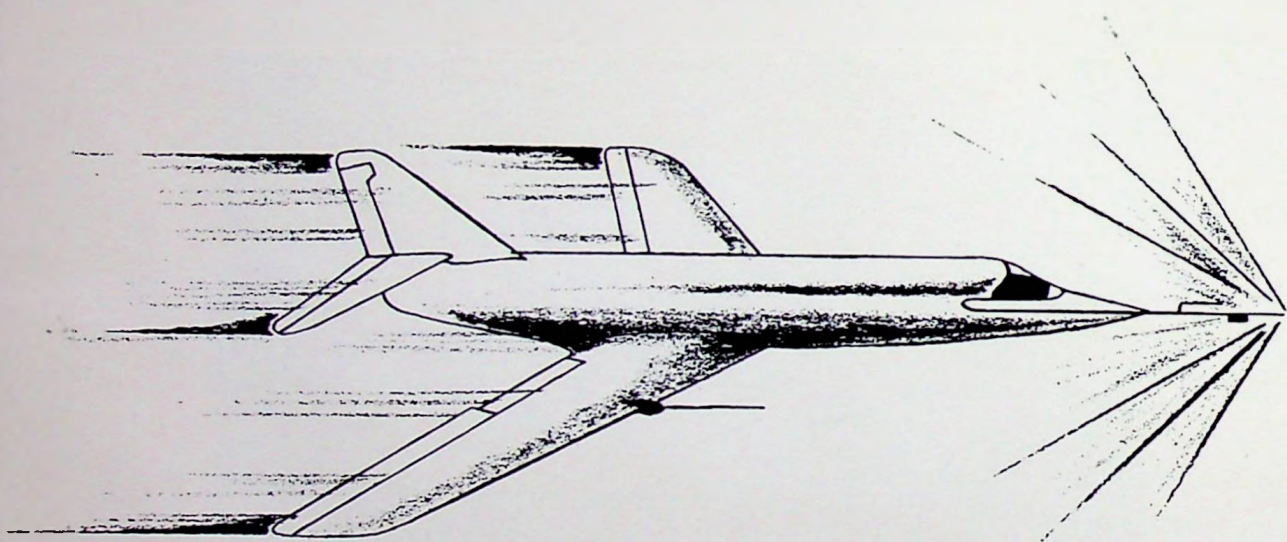

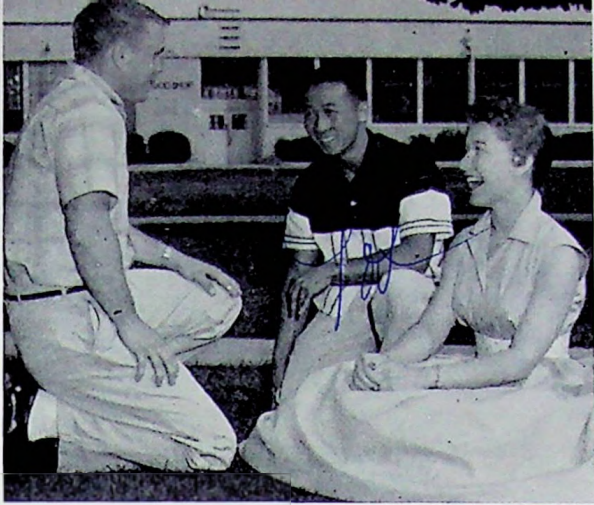

Other fund-raising projects were several bake sales and a car wash held in the spring.

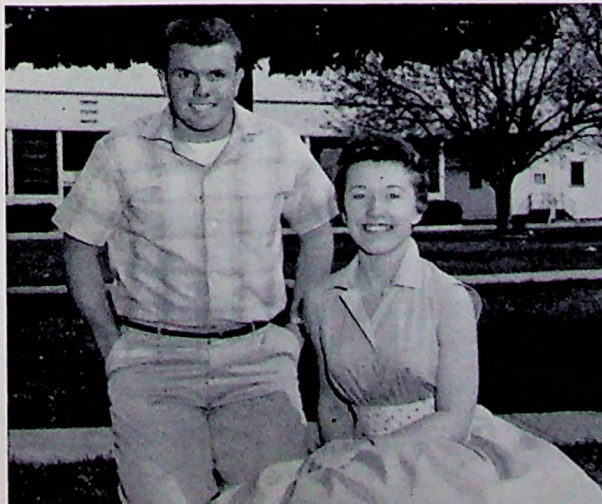
Marshaling the dramatic talents of the class, the seniors presented the play "Father's Been To Mars."

As the graduating Vikings prepared to leave the Kingsburg campus, a scheduled week of activities was climaxed with commencement exercises June 6.

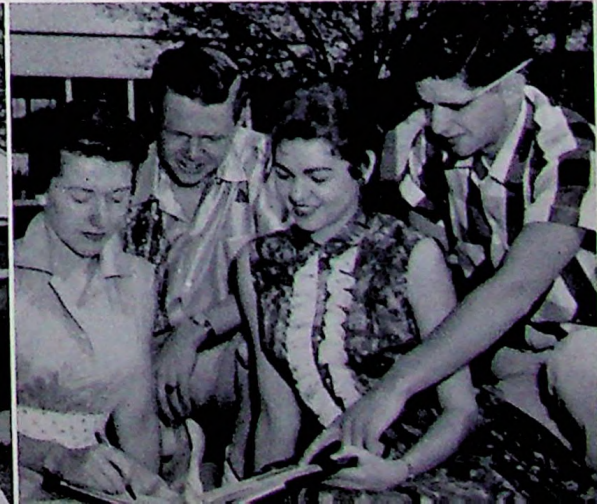

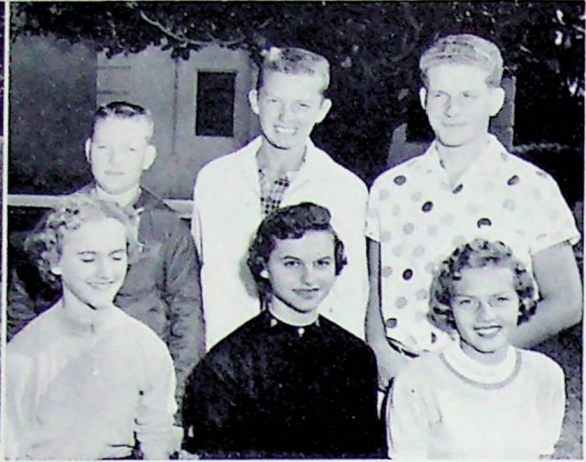

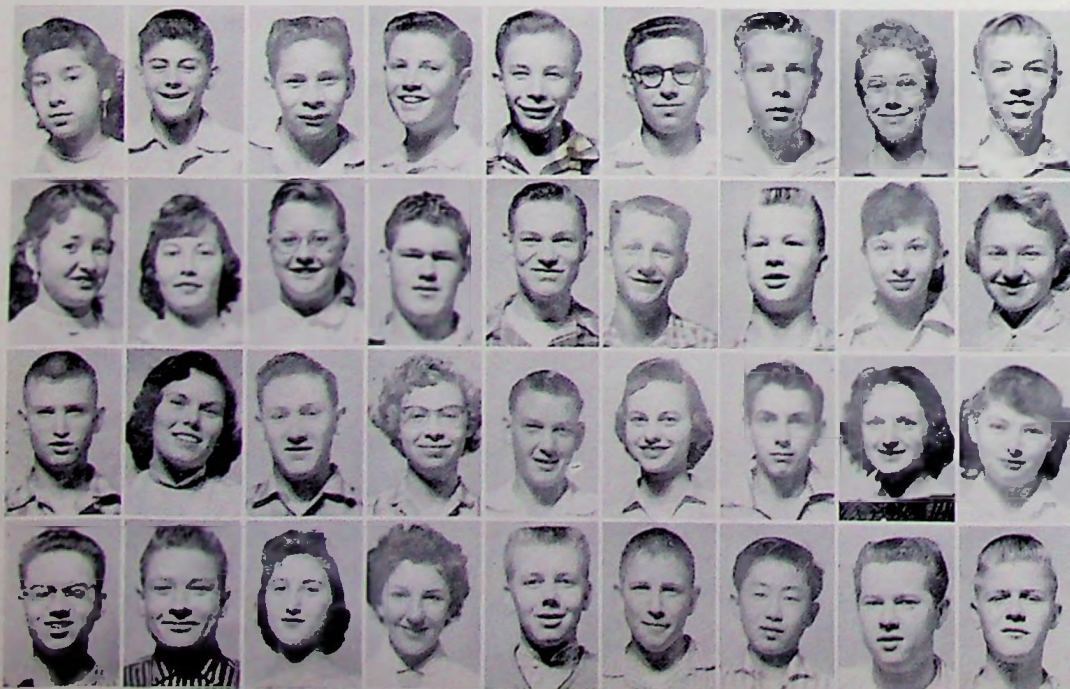
## FRESHMEN

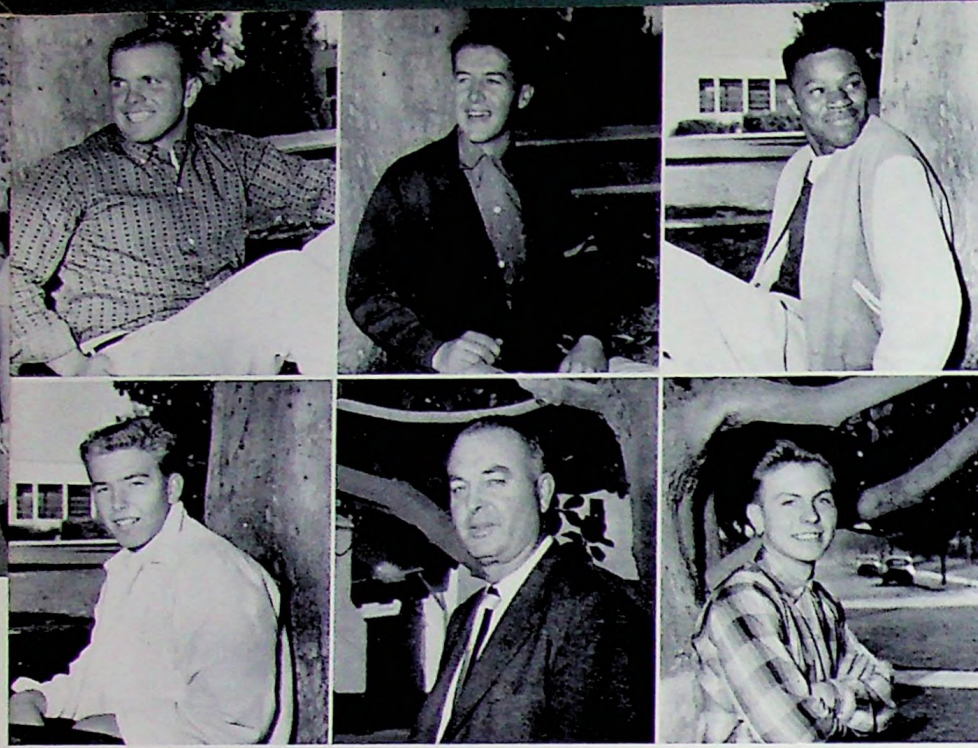

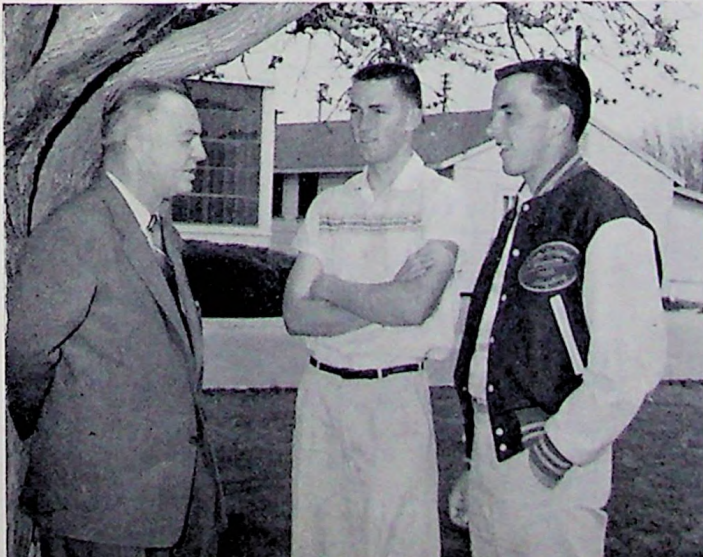

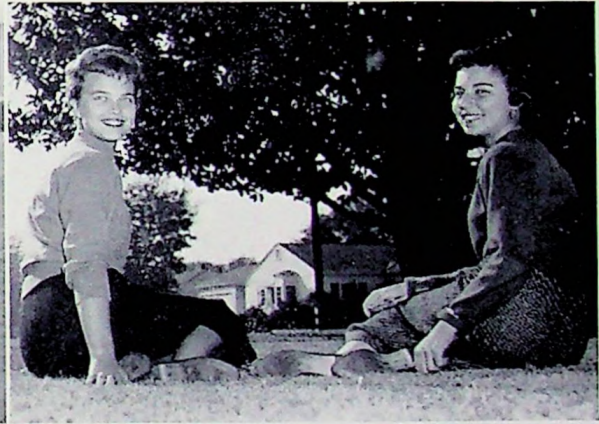

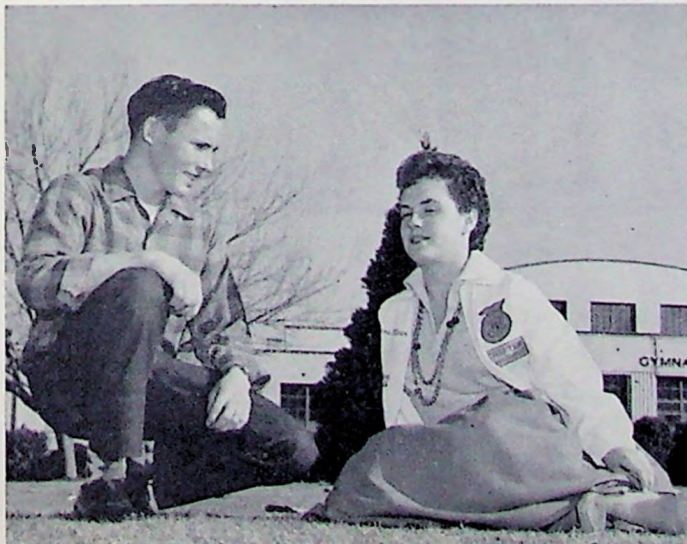

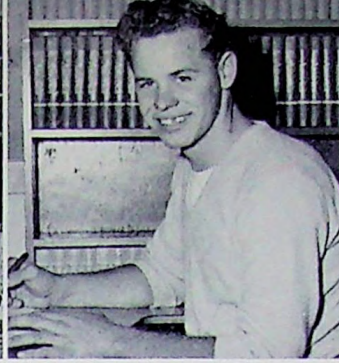

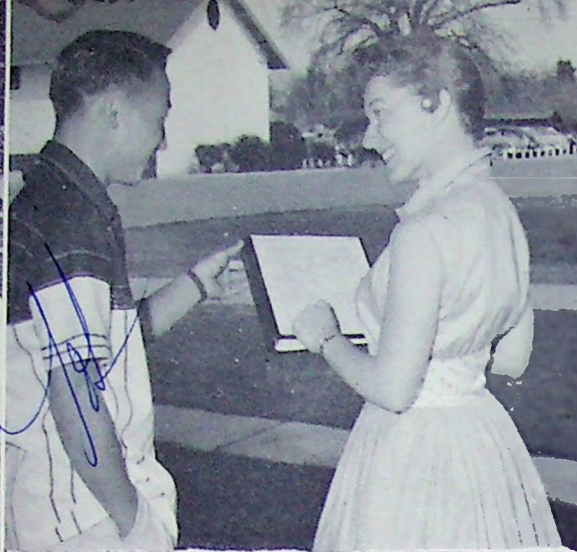

## C.S.F.

In order to qualify for membership in C.S.F., all students must have ten points. In a solid subject, A's count three points and one and one half points in a nonsolid subject. B's in a solid count one point and one half for a nonsolid. Only semester grades are counted toward the points.

Seniors may become life members, sealbearers, of the C.S.F. if they have been members for four semesters with one semester during the senior year. A graduate receives a gold seal on his diploma if he has belonged four semesters during the last three years.

Records of the graduates who were members of C.S.F. at the time of graduation from 1924 to 1957 are kept on file at Kingsburg High School.

Topics of special interest to high school students were discussed at the spring conference held in Walnut Creek.

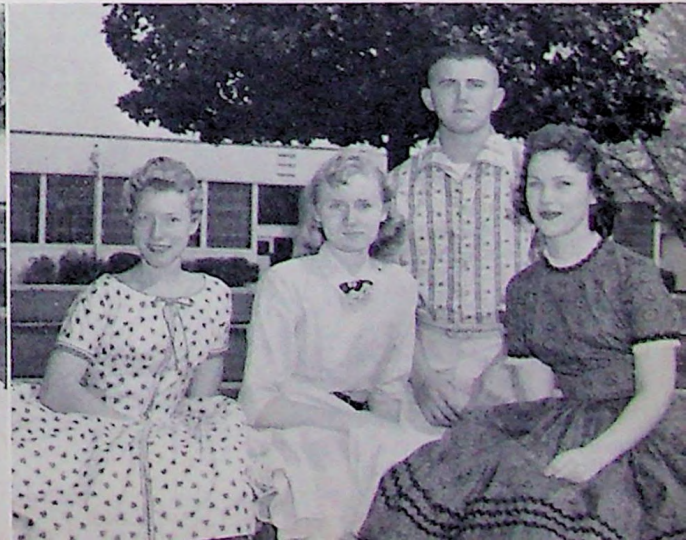
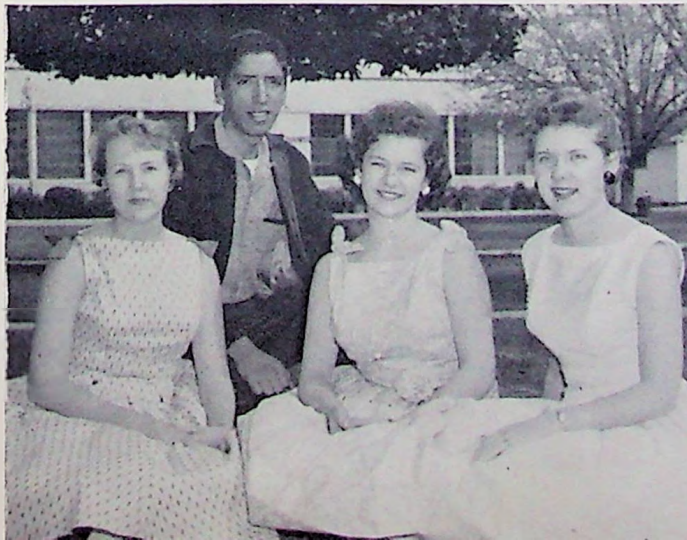

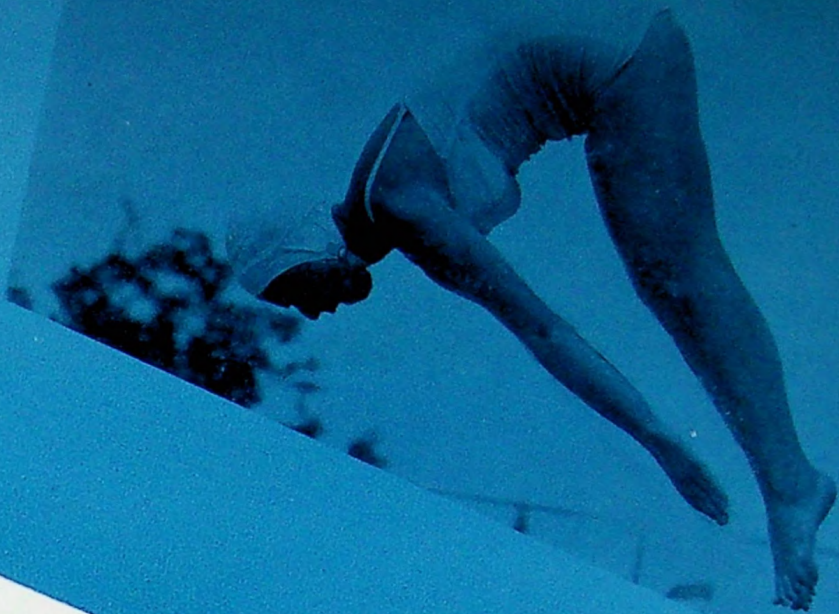
This year the girls participated in a new sport for KHS when the G.A.A. played hockey against Reedley here.

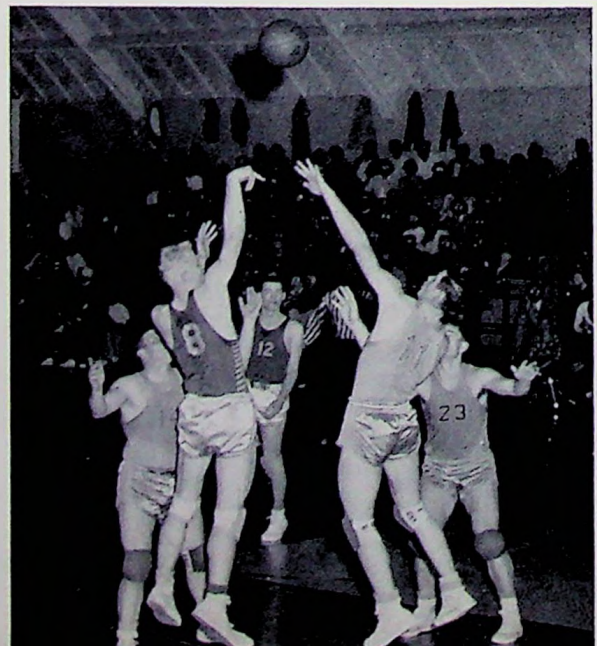

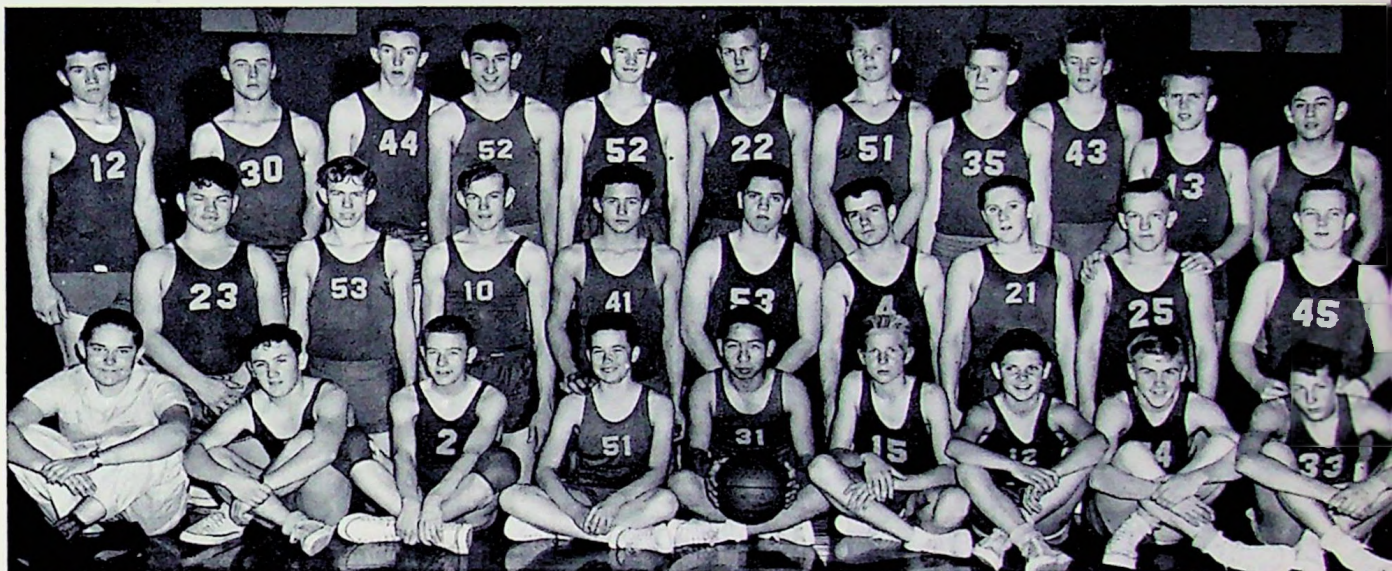

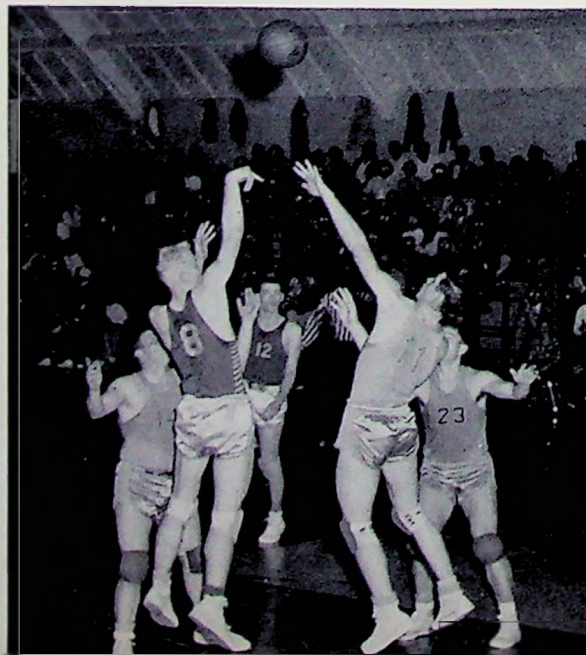

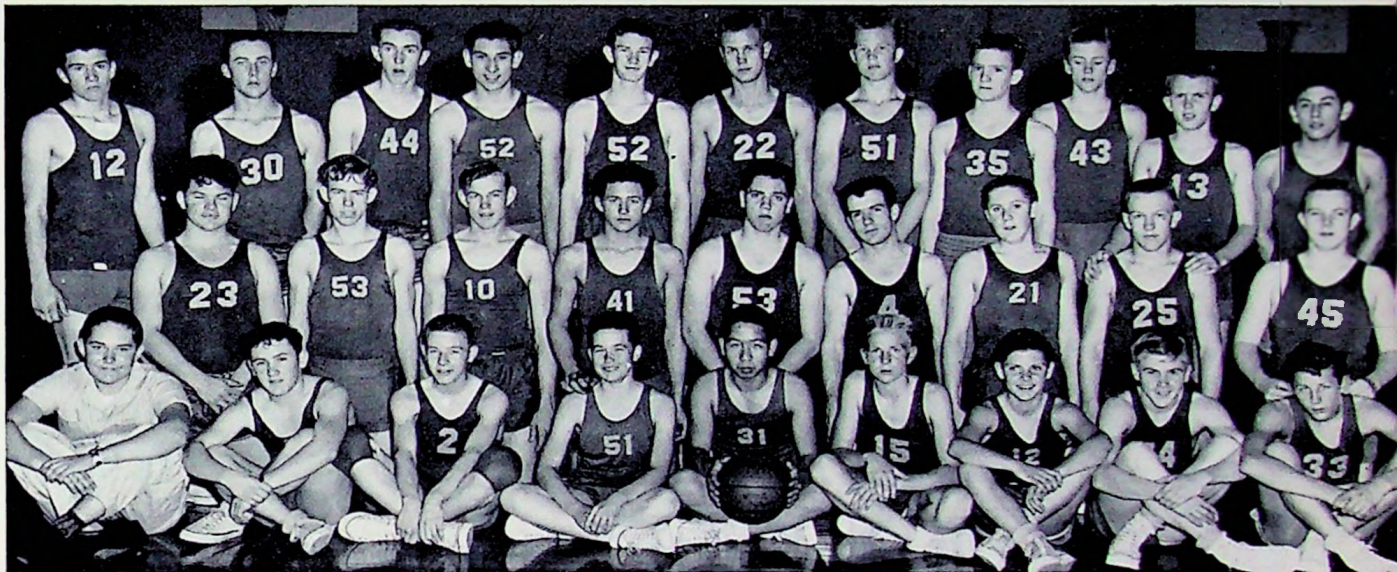

Good hitting, hard play, and good sportsmanship characterized the varsity's well-rounded club.



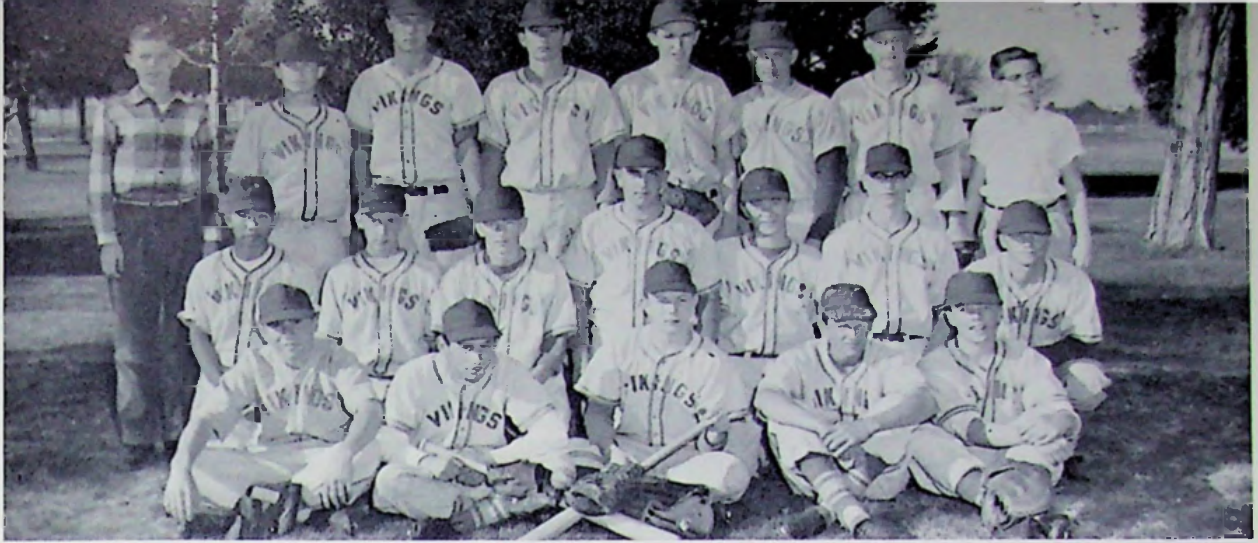

Several of the KHS records were smashed by the athletes, as they continued to raise the standards for future track men.

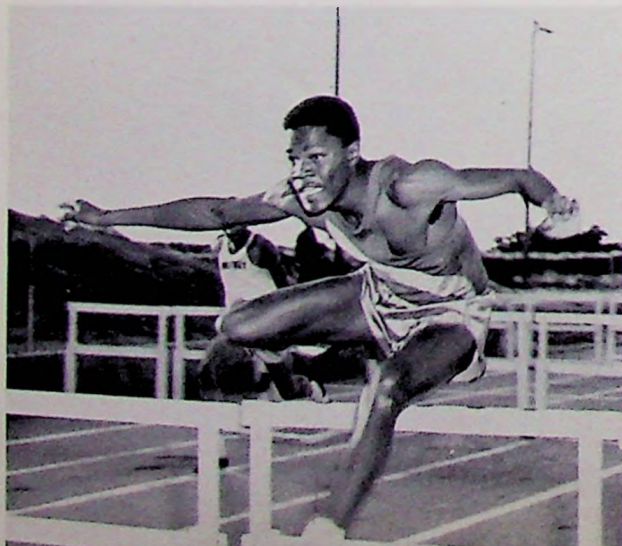
Hal Jenkins, Viking track coach, worked his men hard, produced a successful team, and proved his ability in his first year as KHS track coach.

Highlights of the season were the Wasco Relays, the Reedley Invitational meet, and the Shasta League meets.

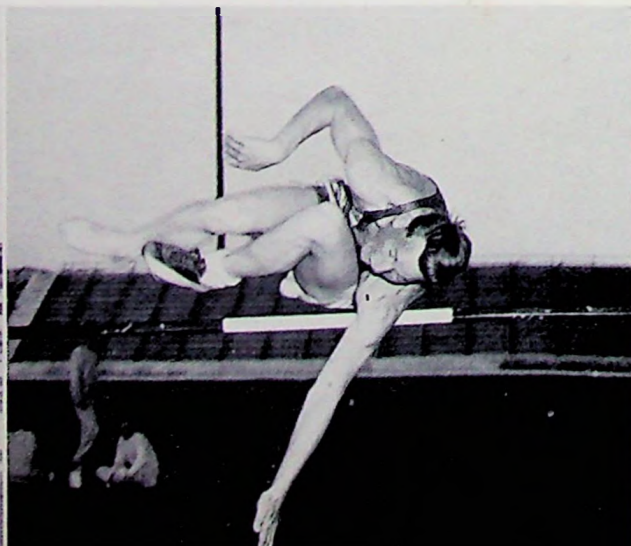

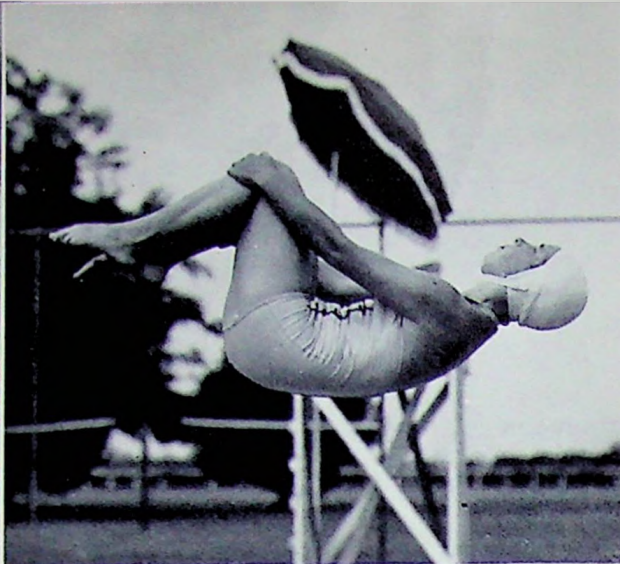

These students, usually girls, are available for work in the office or to any teacher who wants a secretary. They do such work as typing, filing, and duplicating.

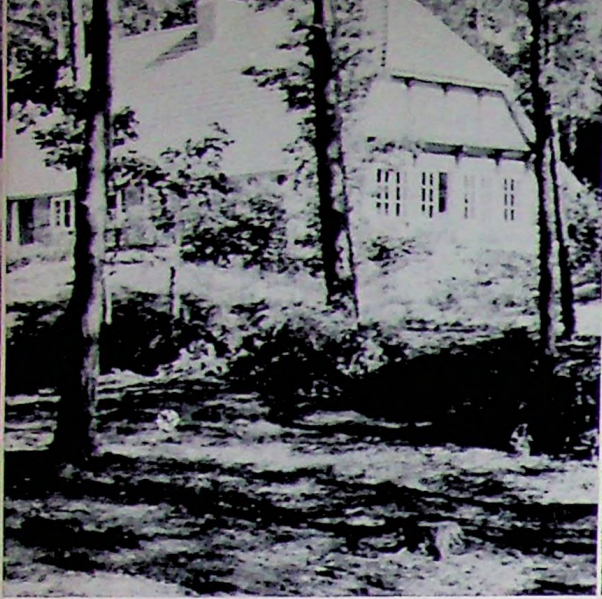

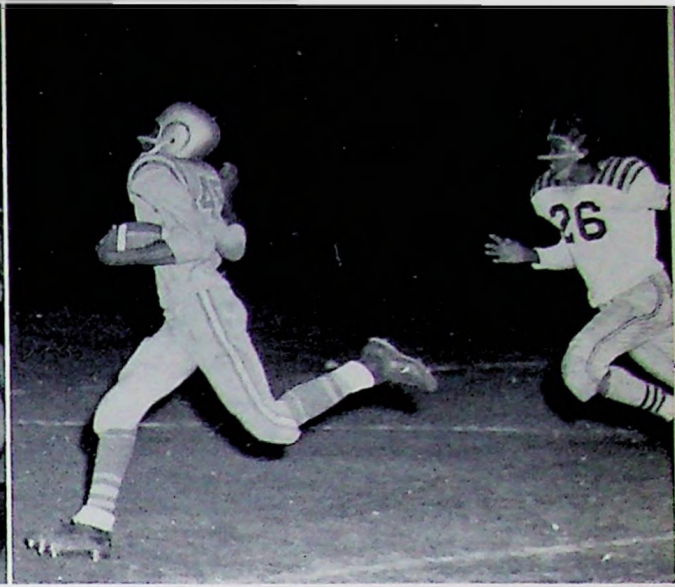
A harvest-moon dance was sponsored by the freshmen, and the juniors were hosts to the Christmas Ball during the holiday season.

The Baccalaureate service on June 2 and the graduation exercises on June 6 ended the school year as the graduating seniors bid farewell to Kingsburg High School.



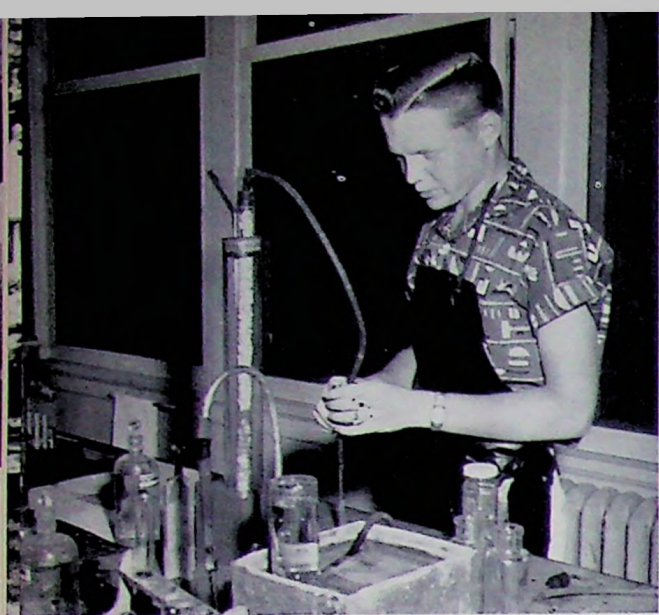

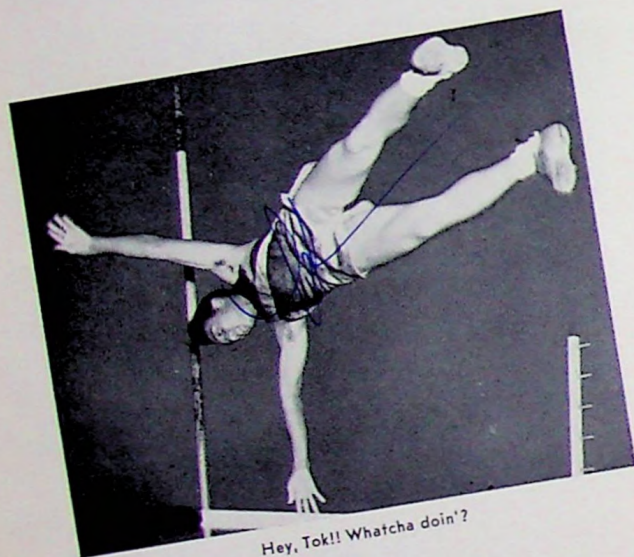
