The guidance of this administration has helped KHS students to understand better the complex problems that arise in the world today.

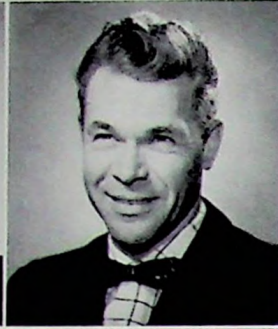

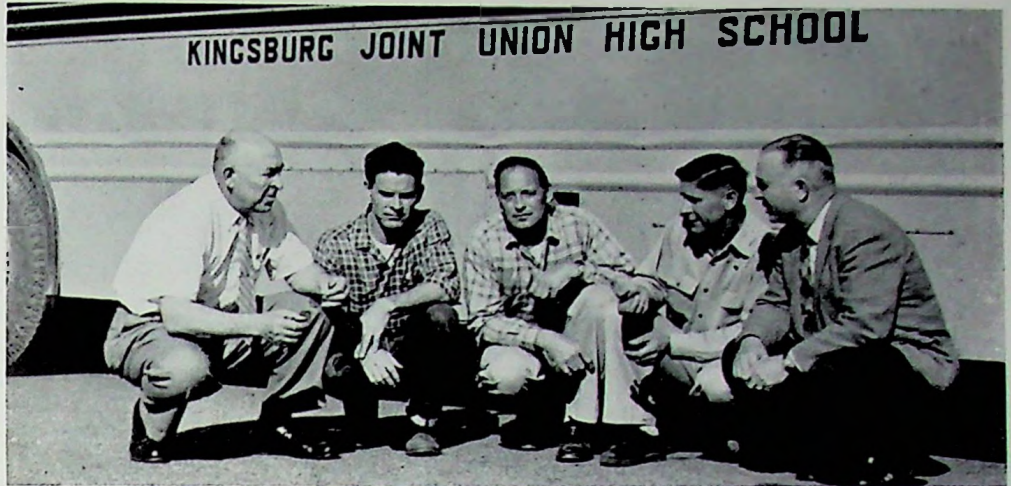

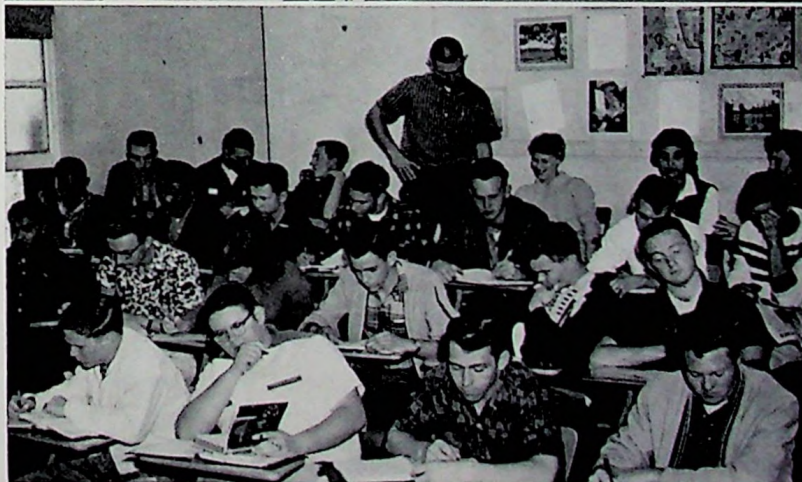

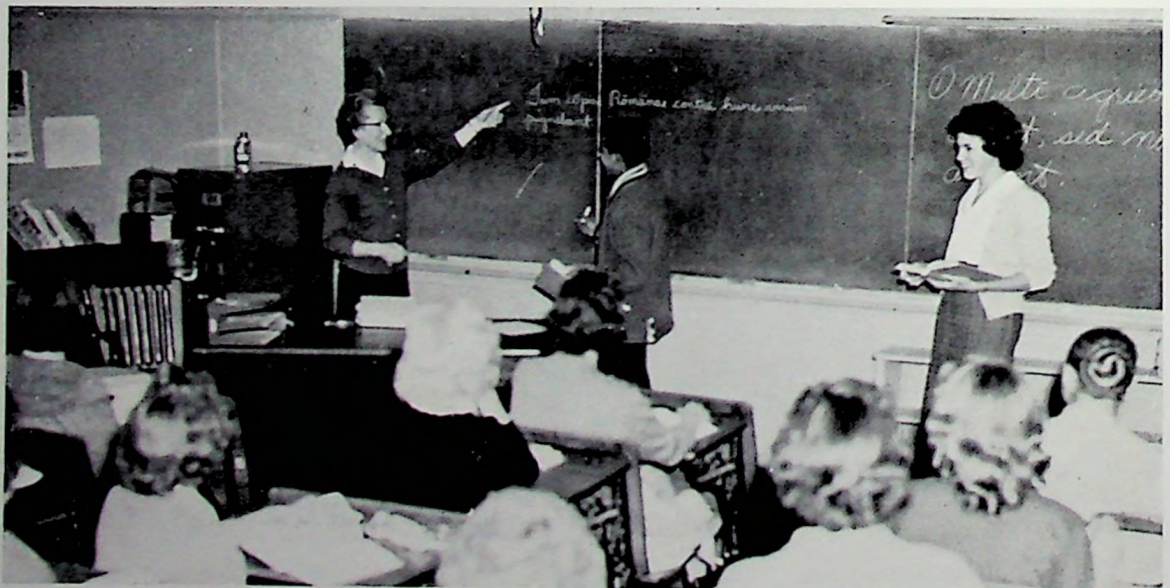

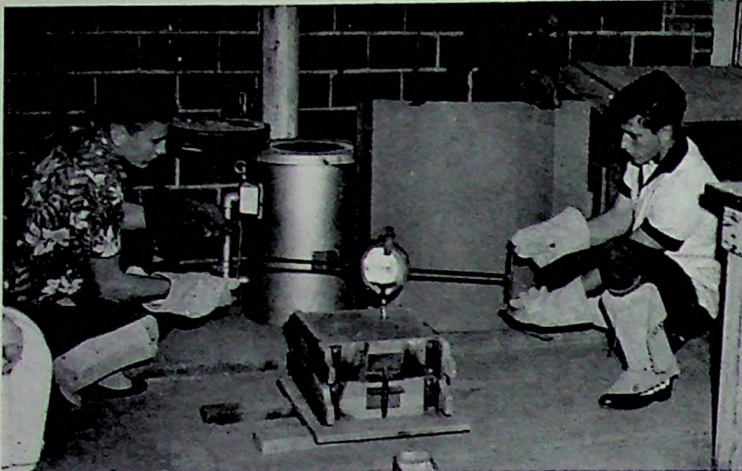

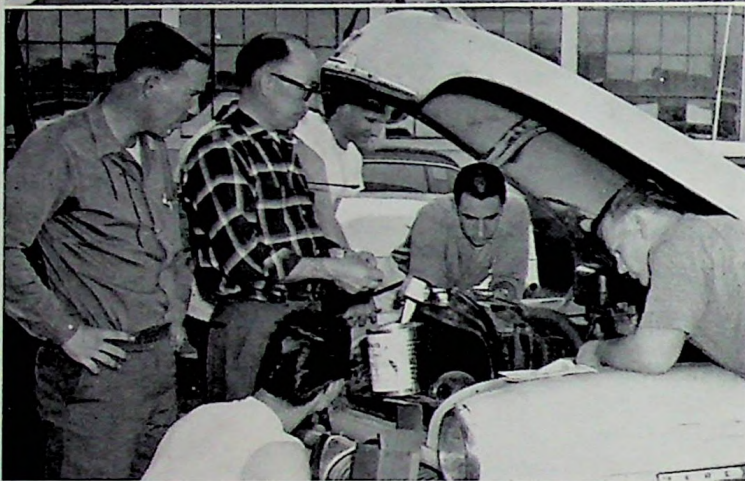

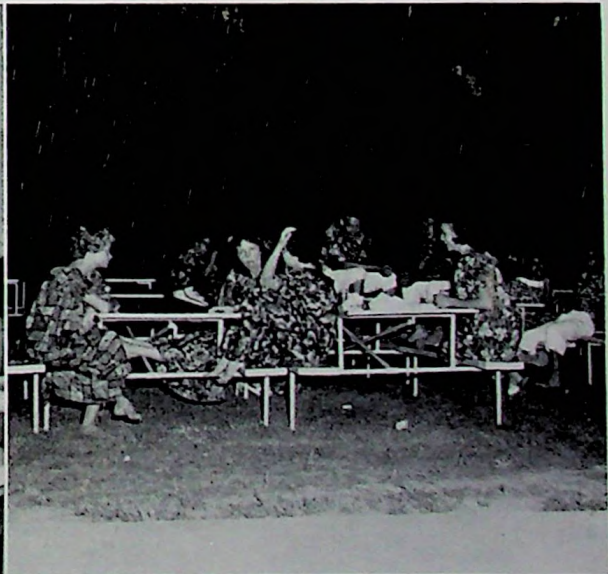
Following a tradition, the juniors were in charge of the concession stands at all of the KHS football and basketball games.

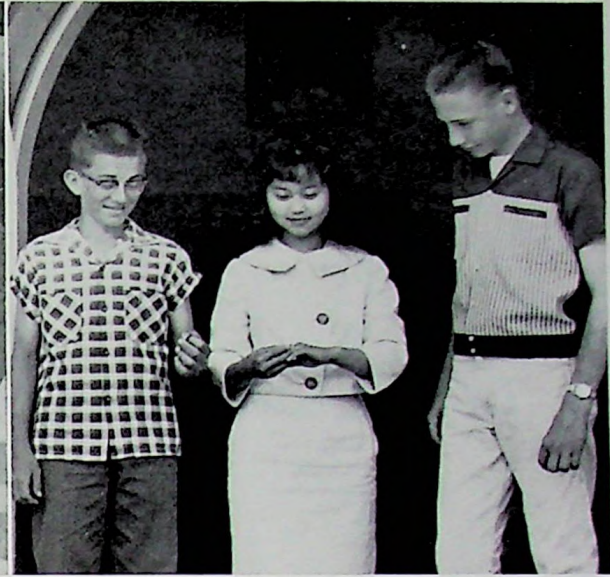

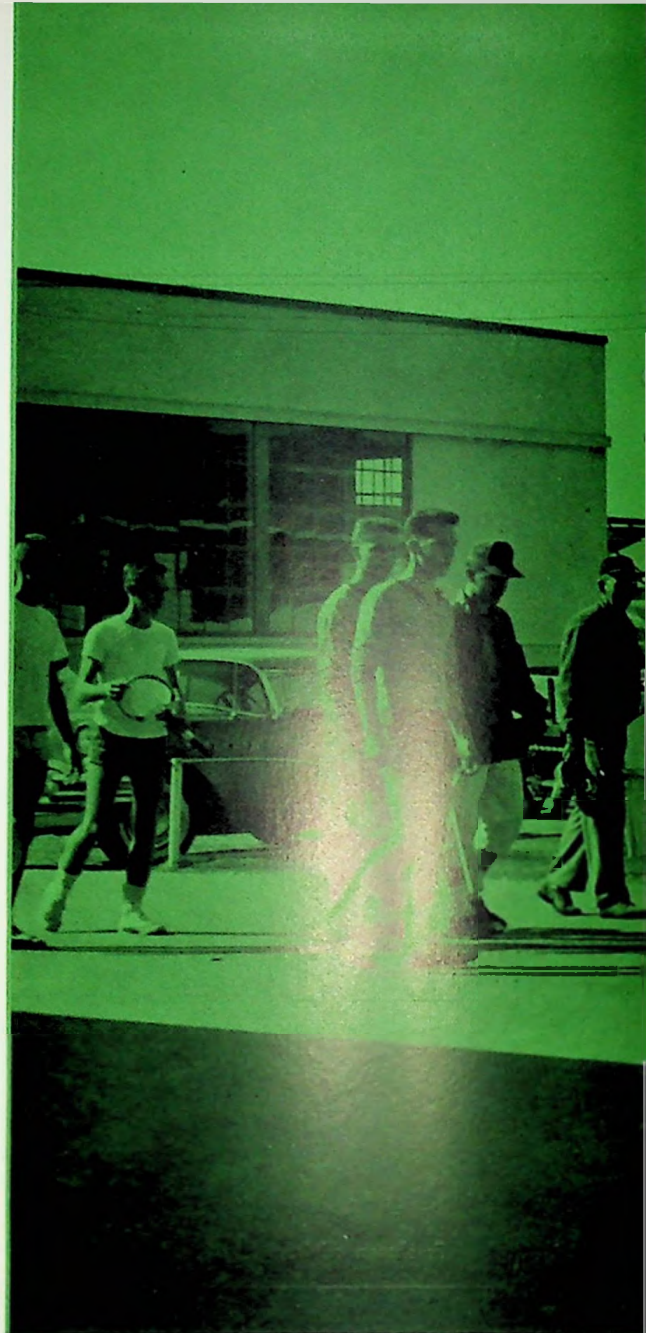

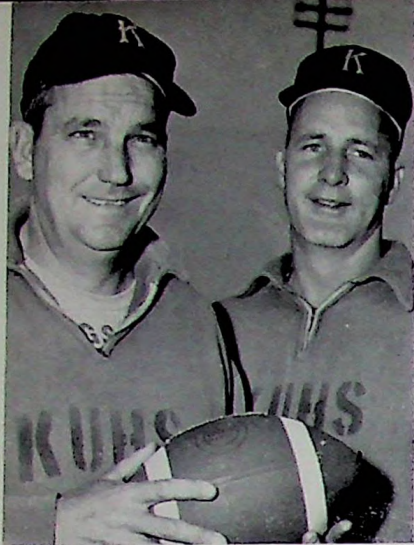

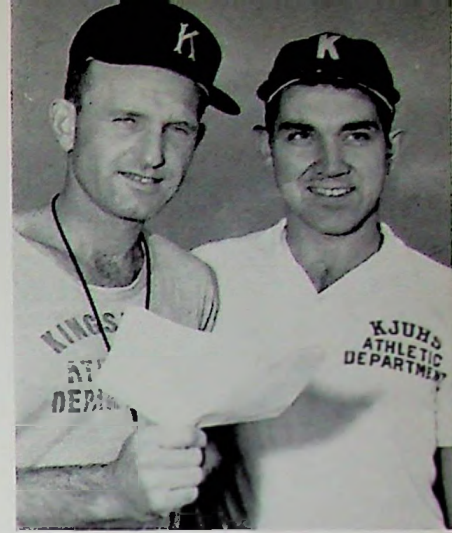
NORSEMEN

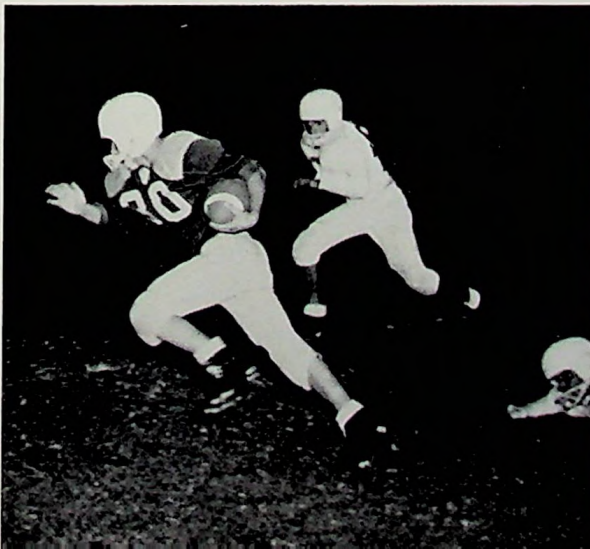

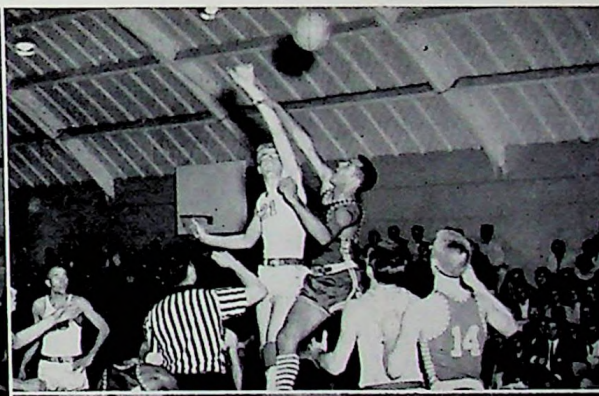

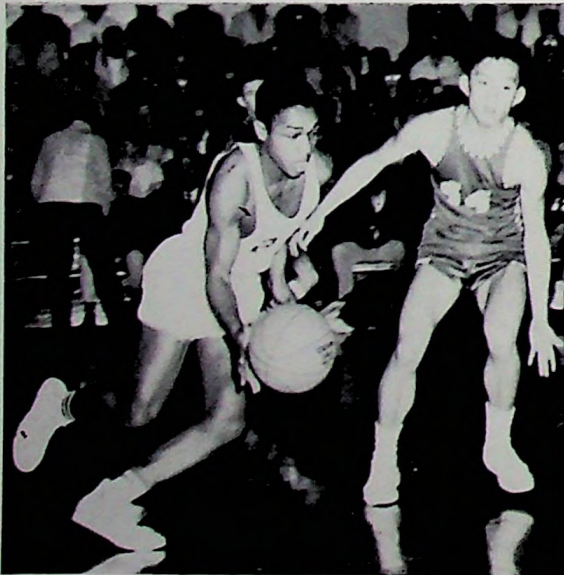
NORSEMEN BASKETBALL

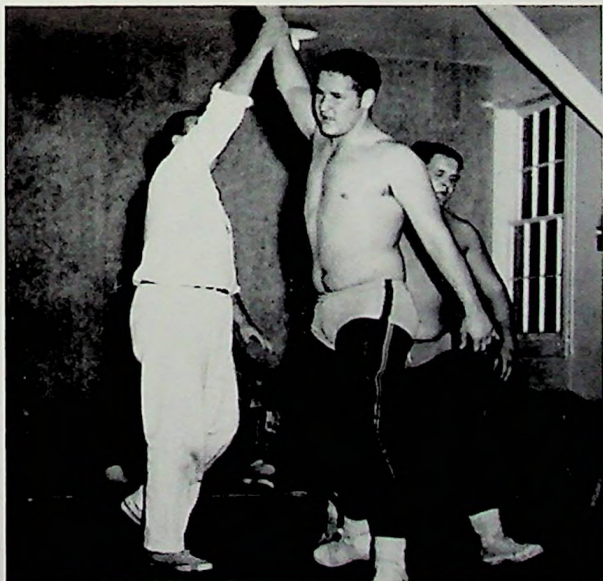
VIKING WRESTLERS

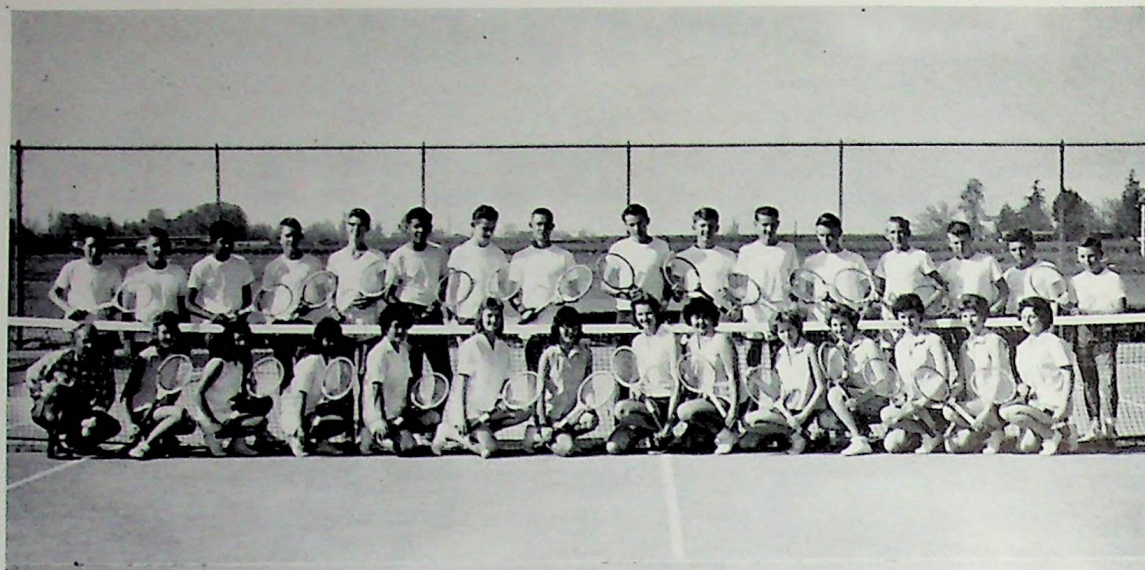

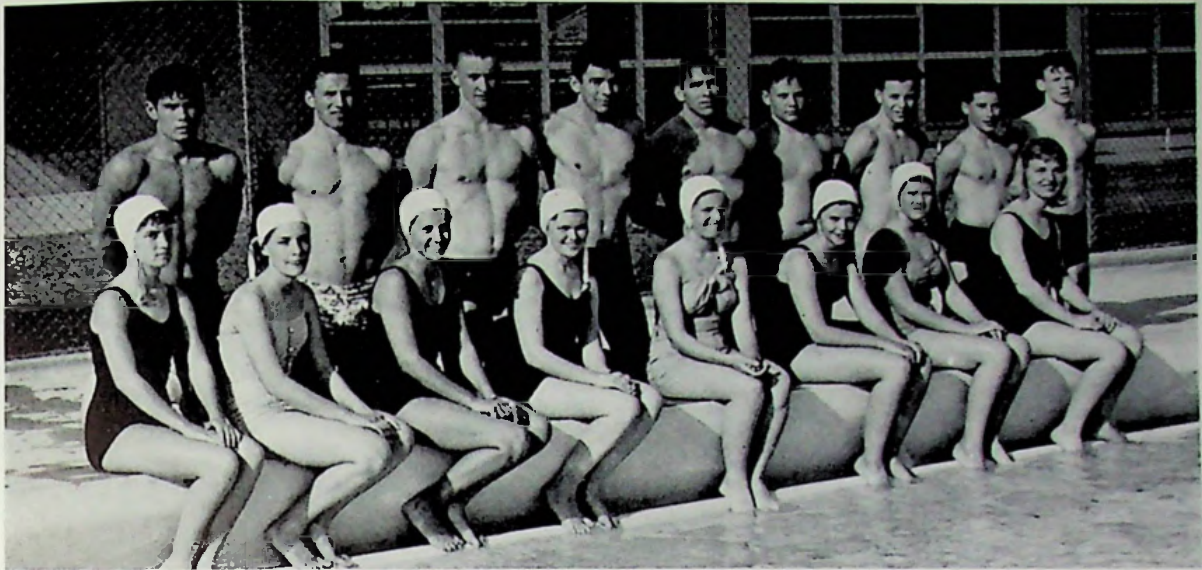

This was Mr. Crandell's first year coaching swimming. Many new practice skills were introduced, which enabled team members to gain speed and timing.

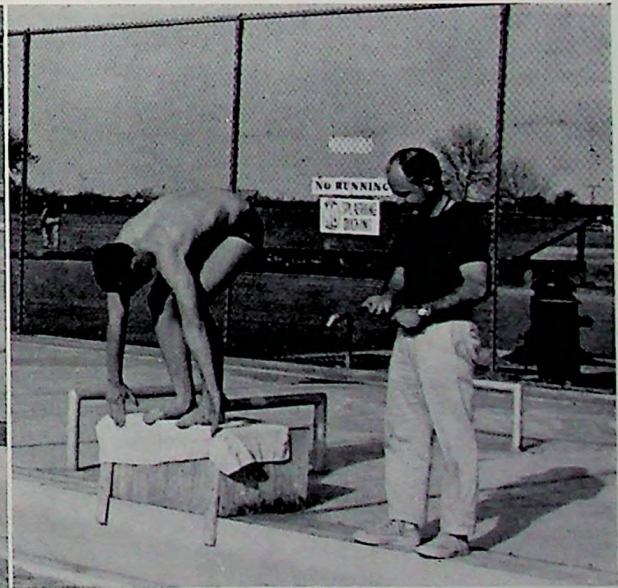

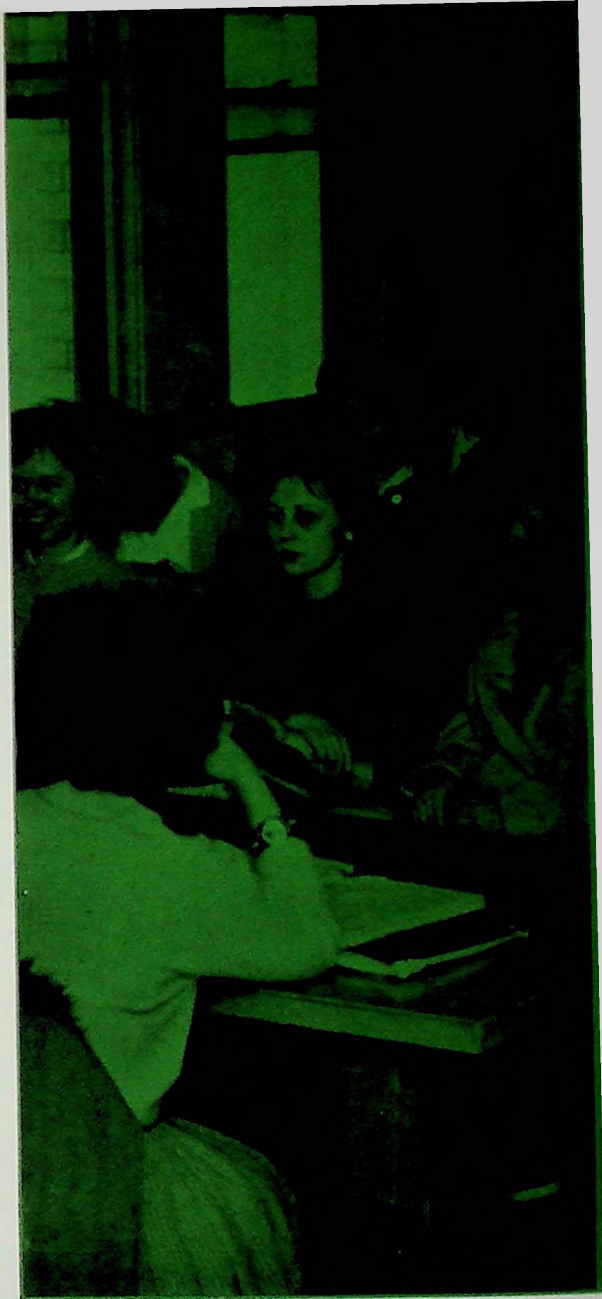

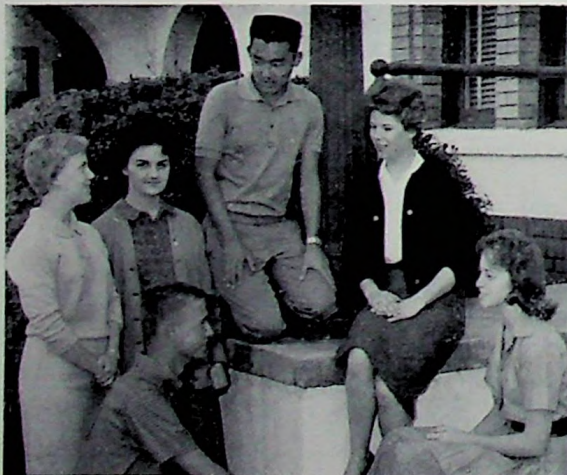

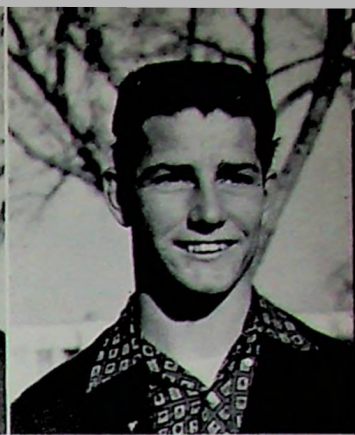

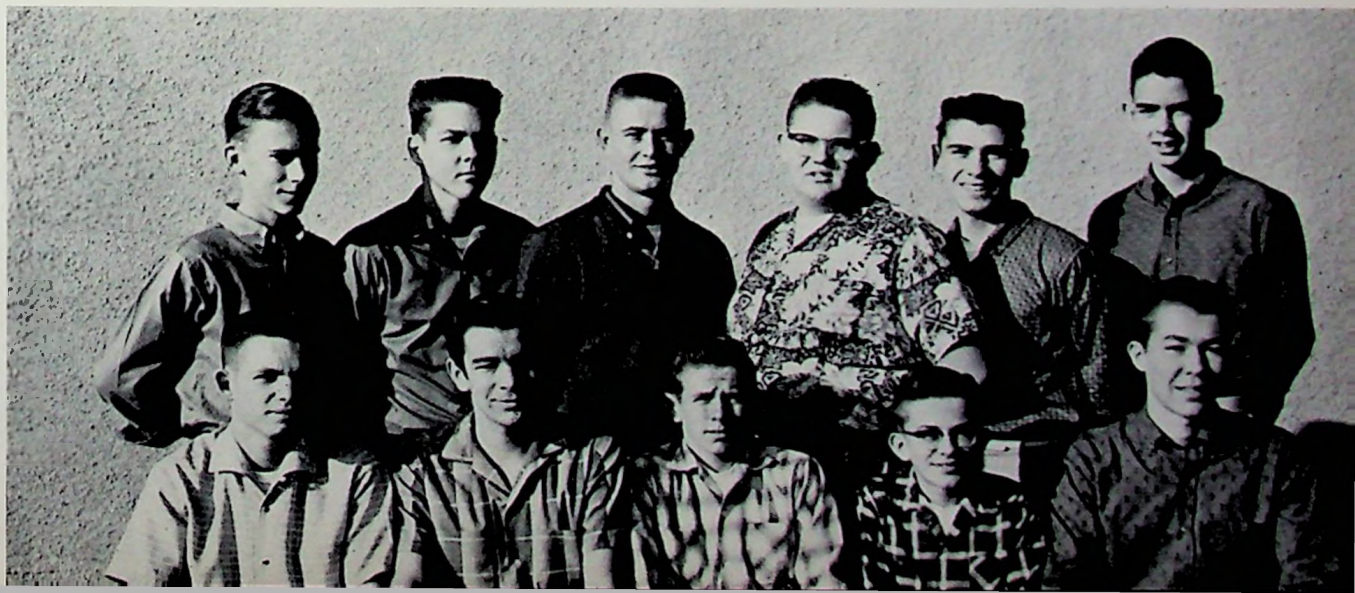

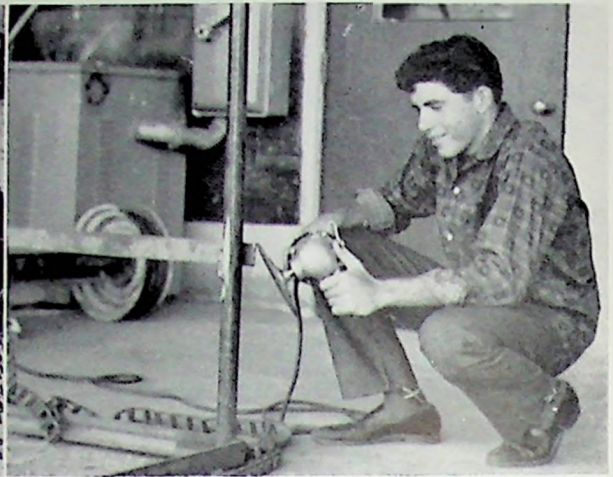

A 16-block march ended this music group's part in the Fresno Diamond Jubilee Parade. As an award, the group was given a second-place ribbon.

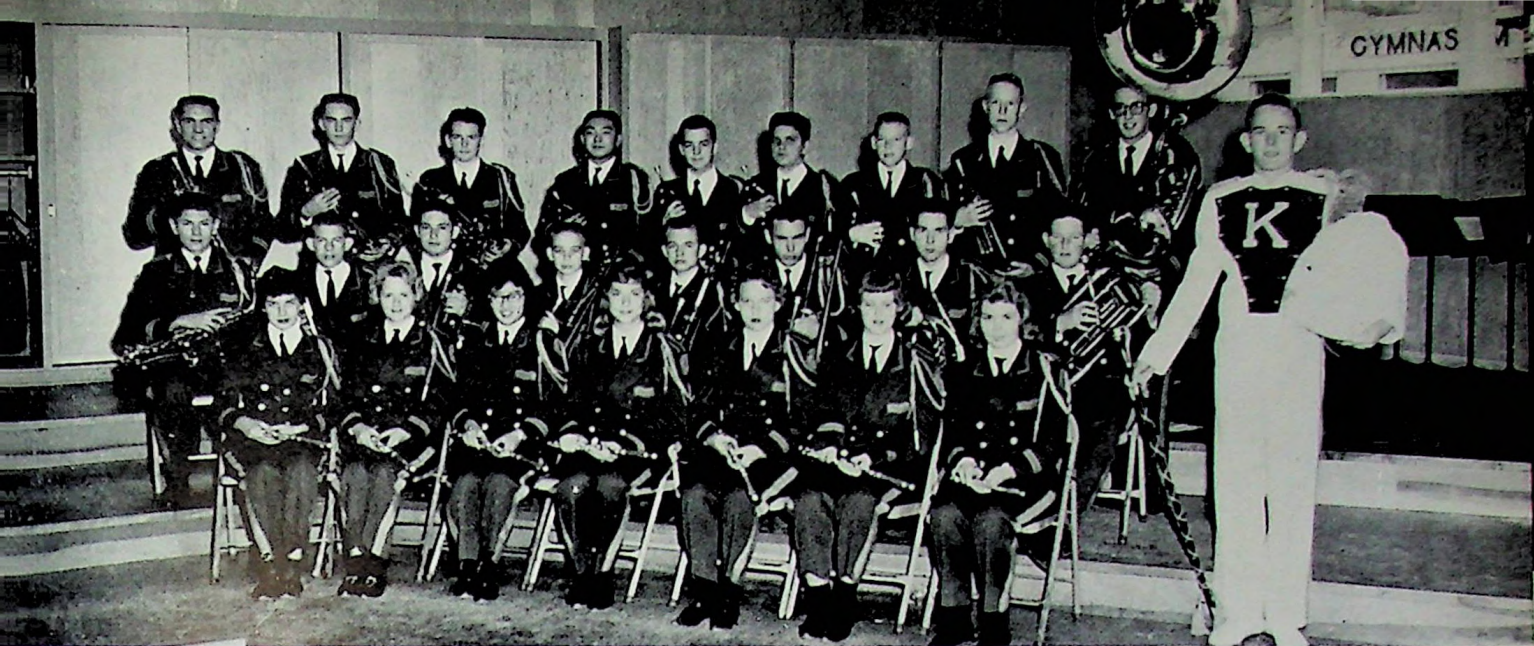
Another outstanding event of the year was the parade in Kingsburg honoring Rafer Johnson after his winning the Olympic Decathlon championship in Rome.

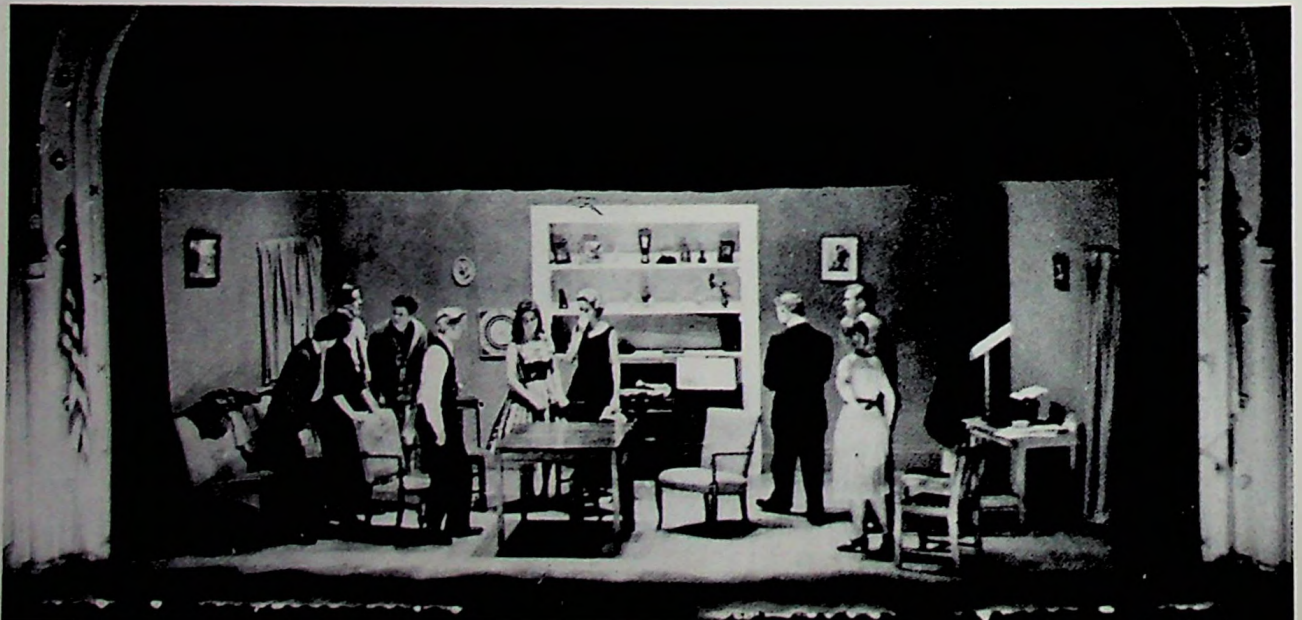

Their relief turns to suspicion when he announces that the killer is one of them.

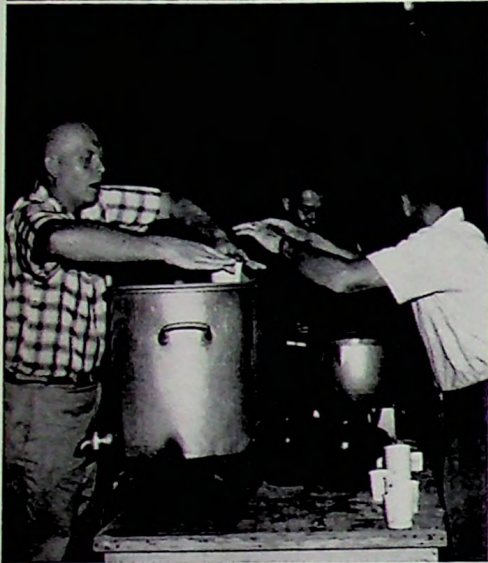

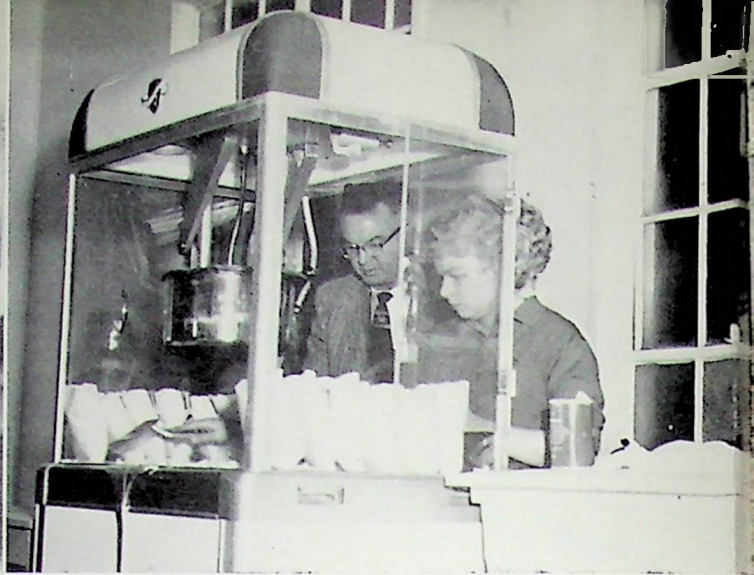

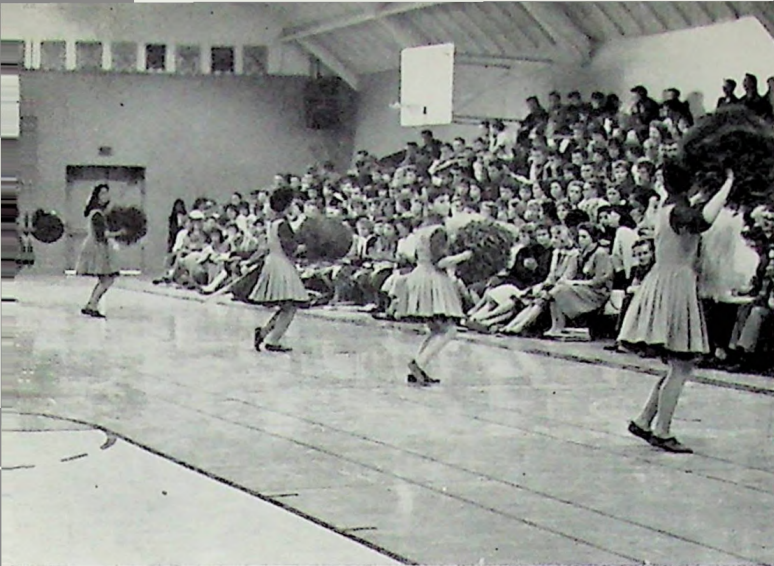
