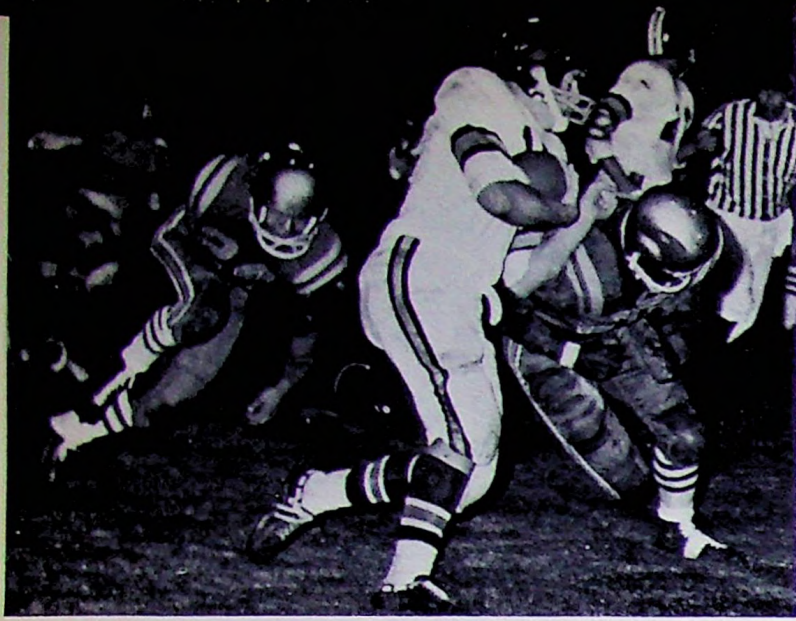

This year the Vikings were off to a fast start to capture the league championship. They handed defeats to three non-league opponents: Caruthers, Tulare Western, and Orosi; and to three league opponents, Reedley, Fowler, and Dinuba. Due to certain injuries, though, the last three games were losses. But even in these losing games the Vikings gave their rivals a rough go.

The Reedley game can be considered one of the finest games played during the year. At the end of the half, Reedley was ahead seven to six, but at the end of the game Kingsburg was ahead 32-7. Reedley had been expected to win. Their line outweighed the Vikings' and they were rated as having a "hard-to-beat" defense. The Viking backs held this element in check. The line did very well offensively.

Three team members were honored by being selected on the Northern California Team. David Jackson was so honored twice; Dennis Jones received the honor once. John Jones received this honor three times. At one time he was fifth in leading the state in number of touchdowns made. He, along with David Jackson, was chosen to be on the County Football team.

As in the past, the annual Football Banquet climaxed the season. John Jones was voted "The Most Valuable Player" and Gerald Nagata was chosen as "The Most Improved." Co-captains for next year are Doren Landsedal and Dennis Safarjian.

The 1963-'64 Norsemen Football Team was coached by Mr. Sam Crandell and his assistant, Mr. Darel Sorensen.

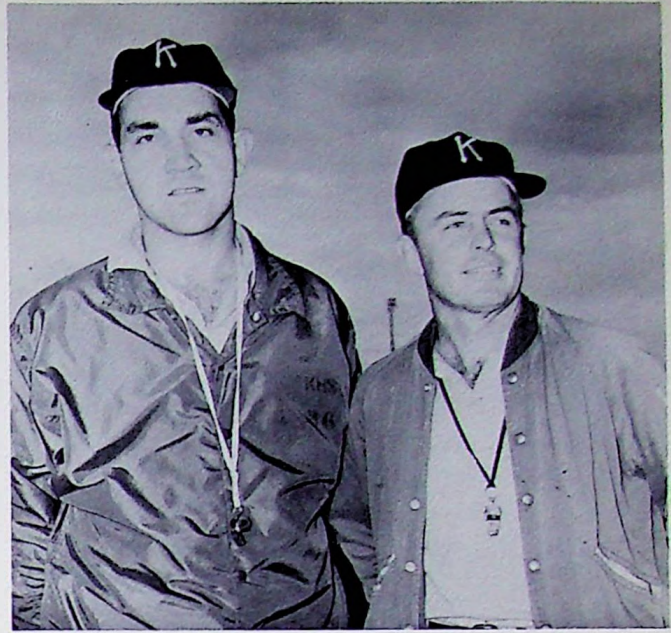
The team showed good spirit and a definite willingness to fight hard and practice diligently, and they gave their opponents rough competition.

The Norsemen started the season with two wins, but Tulare Western broke this streak when they won by a close score of 7 to 6. However, this was a non-league game.

During the season the "B's" won some games and lost some, but they all gained good experience. When the season was over, the Norsemen had four wins and five losses. Only two of their wins, however, were league victories.

On December 4 the annual football banquet, sponsored by the Y's Mens, Lions Club and the Kiwanis Club, was held. Awards were given to the Norsemen by their coach, Sam Crandell. Alan Pickrell was named best freshman lineman and Tim Inouye best freshman back. Plaques were awarded to the most valuable player, Robert Carlson, and most improved player, Albert Ramirez. Varsity Basketball

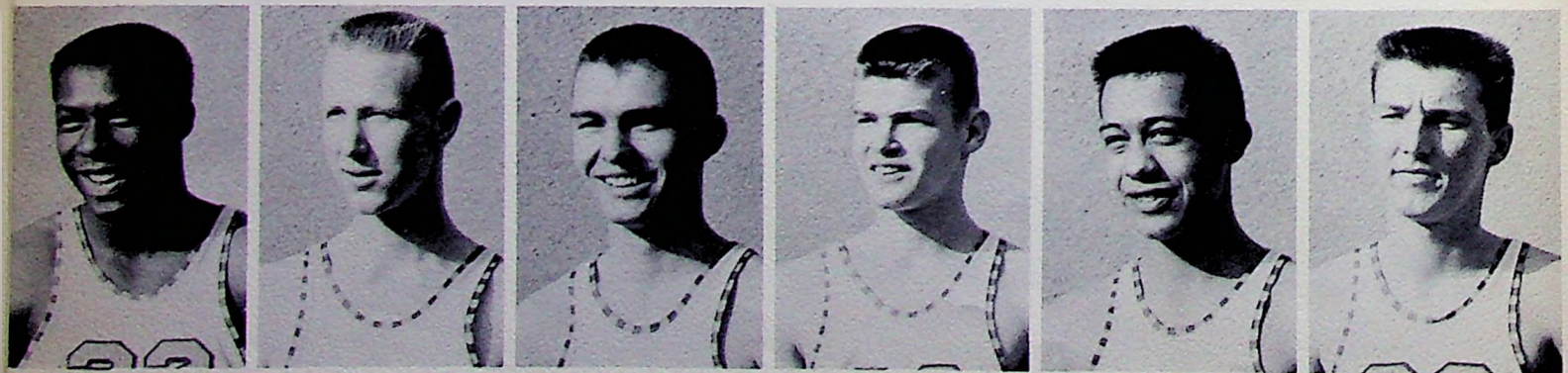
The Kingsburg Varsity Basketball team under new coach Felix Wilkerson compiled its finest record in the last six years by winning fourteen games and losing only five.

The mighty Vikings swept through their practice schedule beating Riverdale, Lindsay, Caruthers, and Sanger once each and Lemoore twice while losing only to Reedley in the finals of the Kingsburg Tournament.

The Vikings opened league play with a win over Fowler and continued on to an 8-4 win-loss record good for third place in the Central Sequoia League. The highlight of the season was a 45-44 loss to undefeated Reedley in the last six seconds of the game.

Coach Wilkerson had the pleasant problem of having six first stringers this year in Dennis Friis, Jim Carlstrom, Bill Nelson, John Jones, Doren Landseadal and Tom Olmos. Doren Landsedal was chosen by the team as captain for the year. Leading scorers for the green and gold were Friis with 232 points, Carlstrom 208, and Landseadal 197. Bill Nelson was the leading rebounder, edging out Friis with 182 rebounds to 165 for Friis. Best field goal percentage record was won by Nelson, having made 51 baskets of 104 attempts for 49 per cent. Friis won the best free-throw percentage record with 62 made of 93 attempts for 67 per cent. Most improved award went to Bill Nelson, Roundballer selected as the most valuable for the 1963-'64 season was Jim Carlstrom.

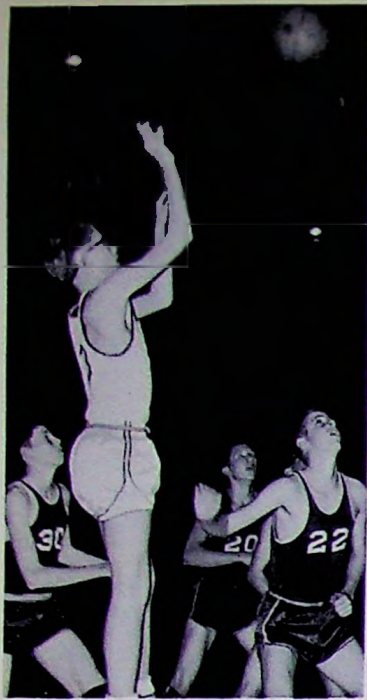

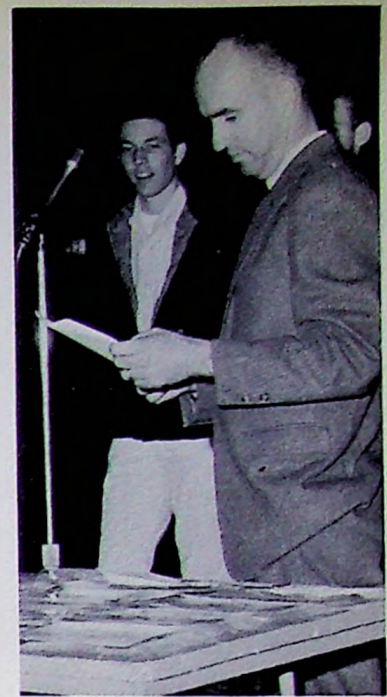
Cross-Country

They set an excellent example for the underclassmen in their diligence in daily workout. Fred Contreras was voted captain of the team and the Most Valuable team member. Renaldo Contreras, a freshman, was voted the Most Improved runner for the season. Renaldo will be counted on heavily next year.

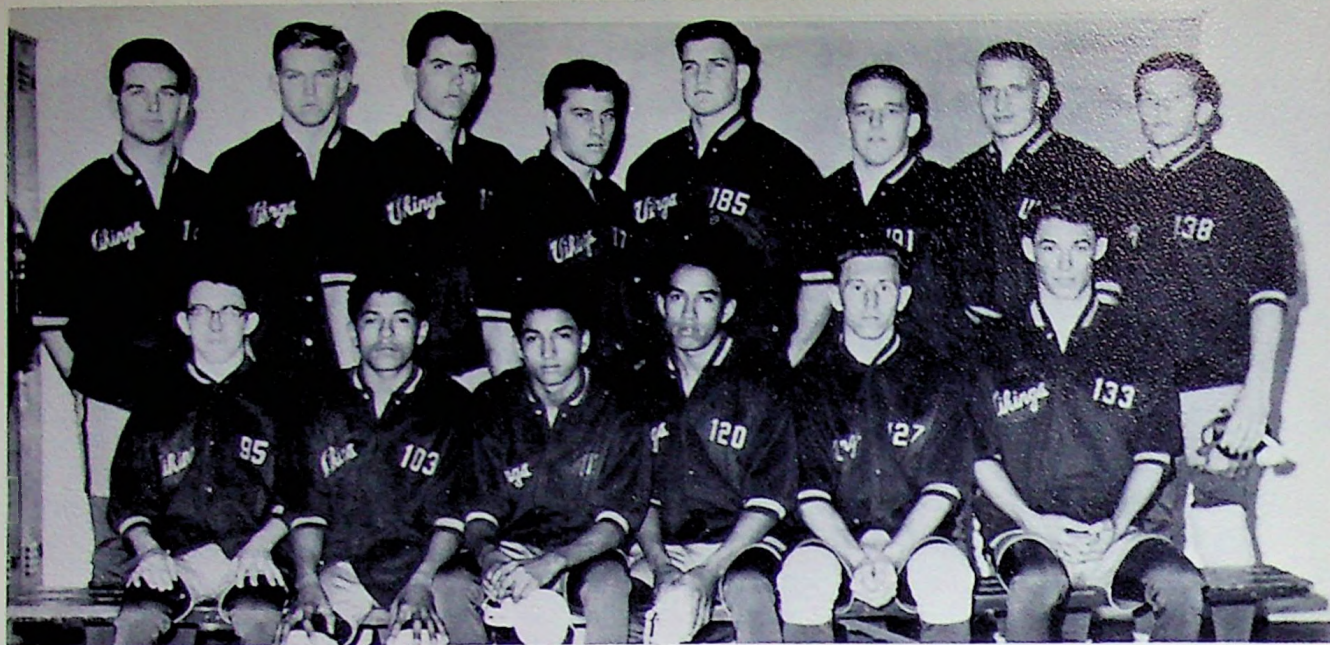

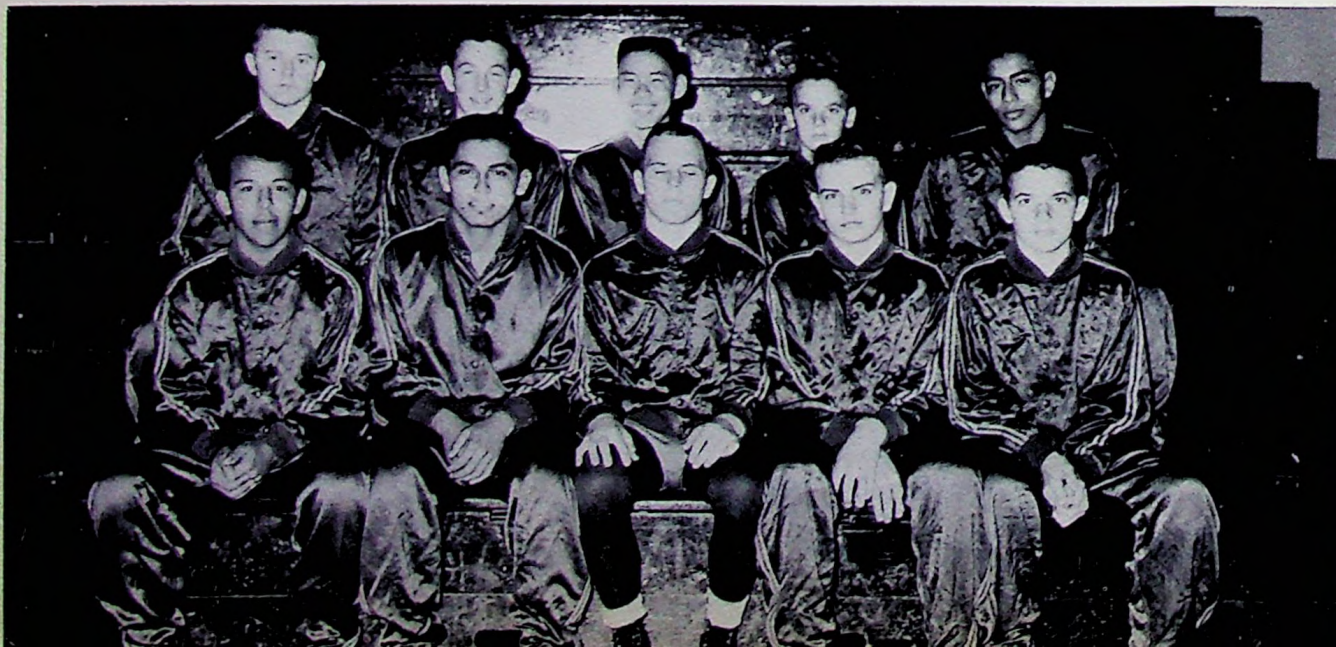
The most improved and most valuable awards went to Viking wrestlers Renaldo Contreras (103 lbs.) and Fred Contreras (120 lbs.) respectively.

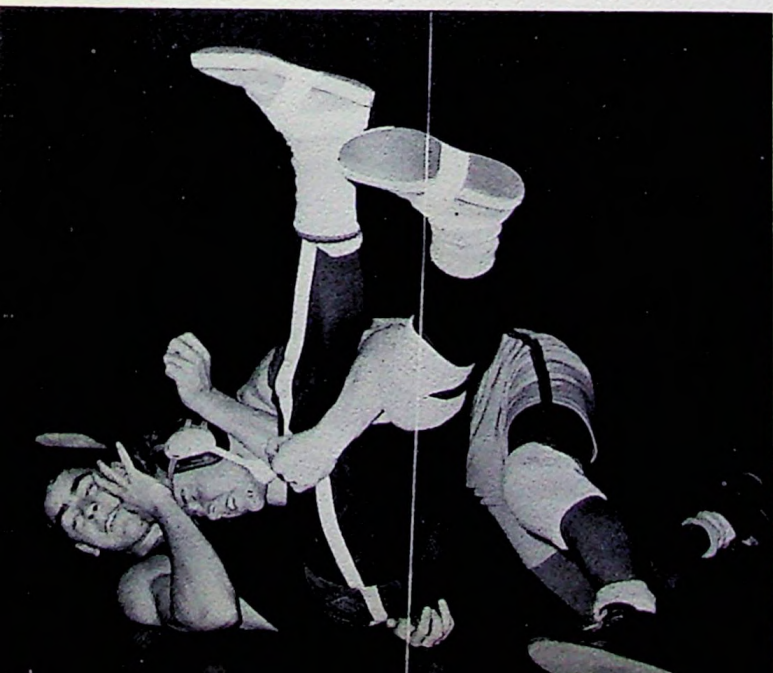
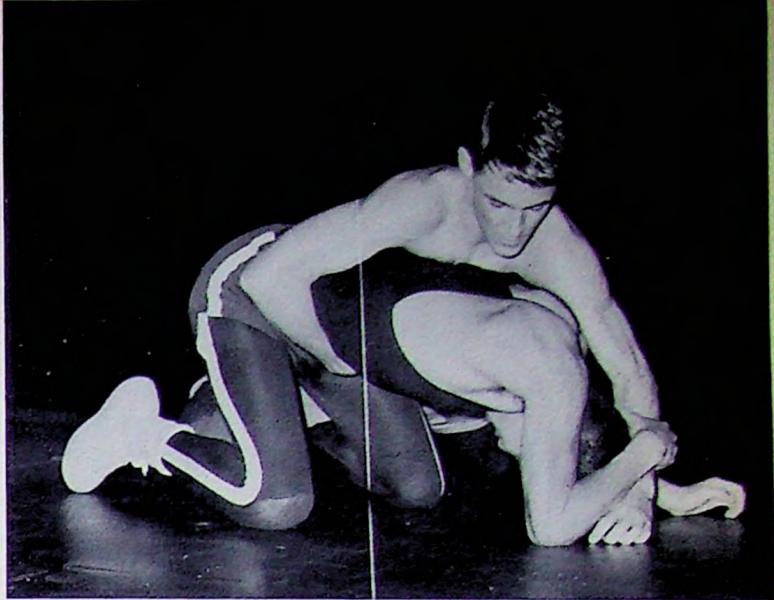
David Jackson went undefeated in wrestling competition until sustaining an injury in the quarterfinals of the Valley Championships at McLane High School in Fresno.

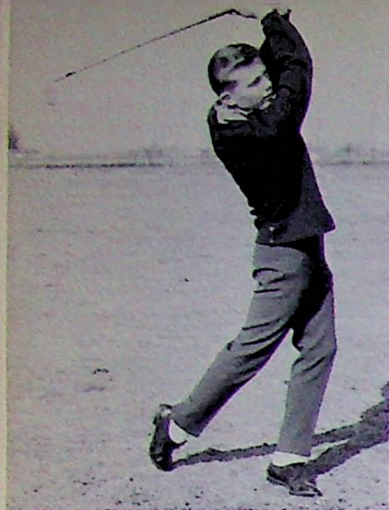

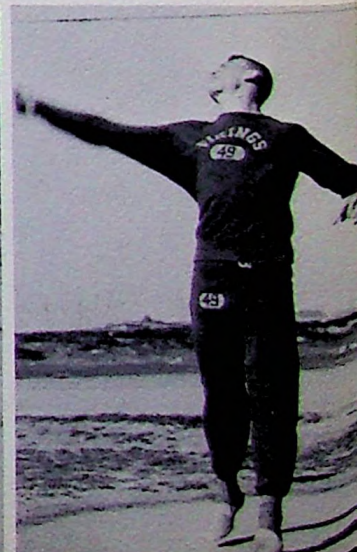
Constant practice involved much work. The team, not yet having reached its peak, showed winning potential in early meets, although falling short of victory.

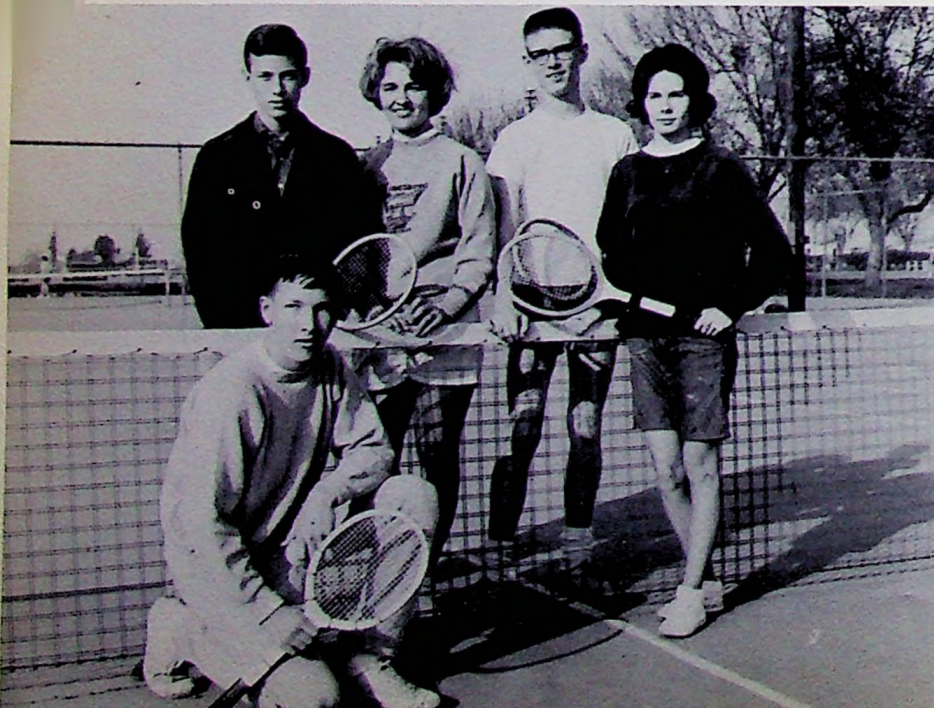

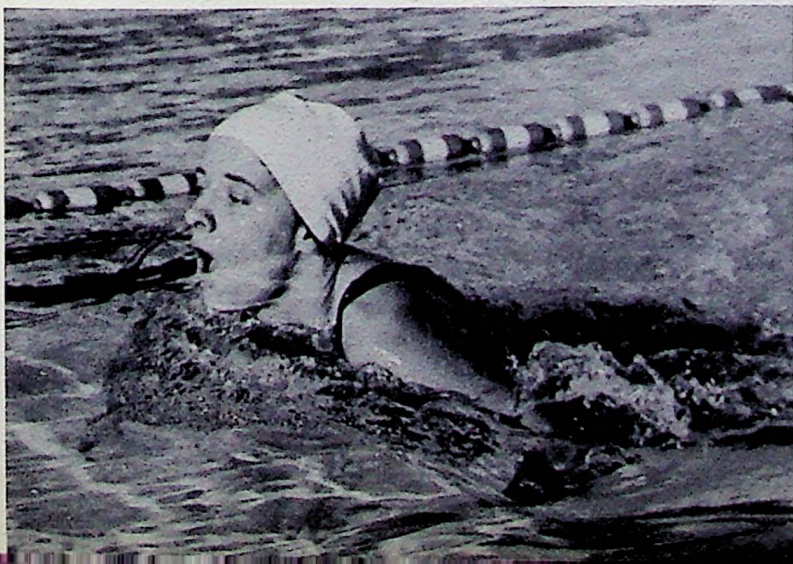

A win over the Woodlake tankers on March 6 seemed to forecast a favorable season for the team.

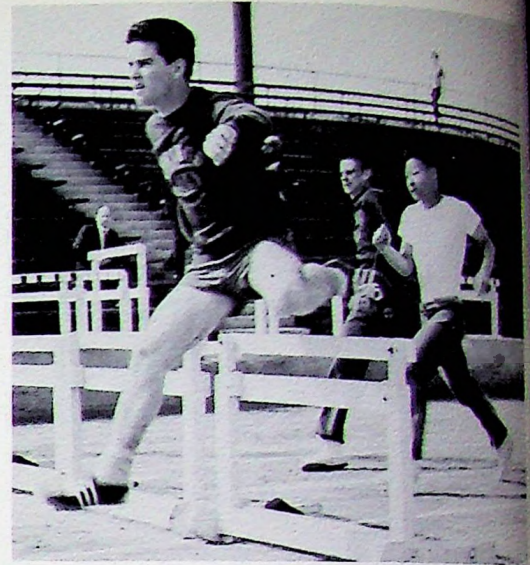

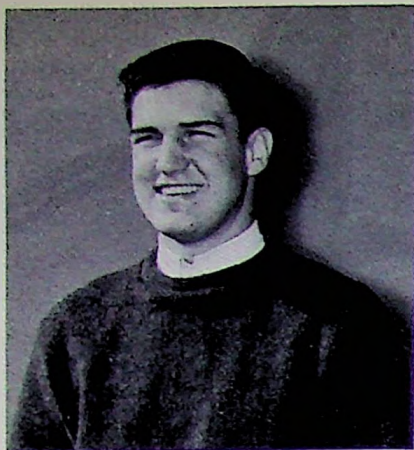




ACTIVITIES

The student body and CSL officers attended four league meetings where they discussed the suggestions and various problems of the schools and adopted a code of ethics for the league.

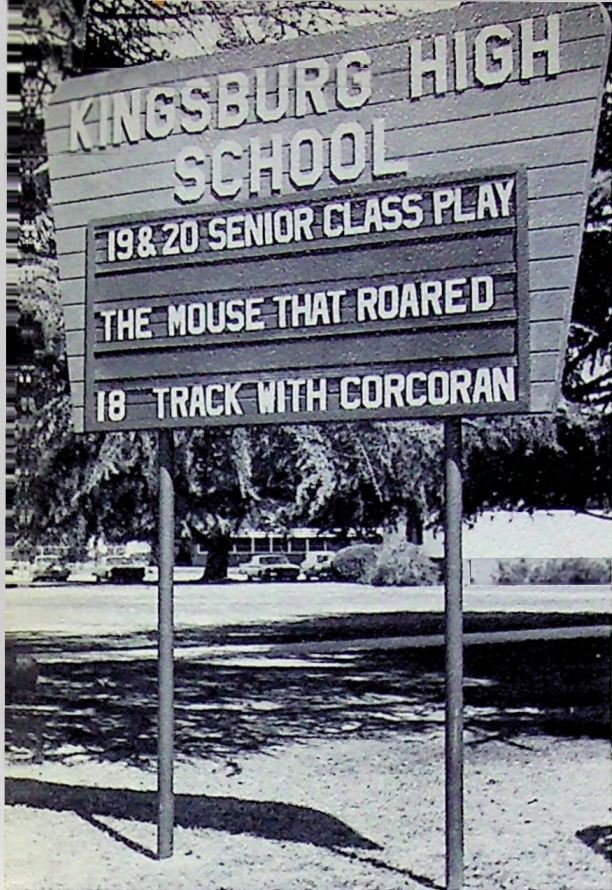

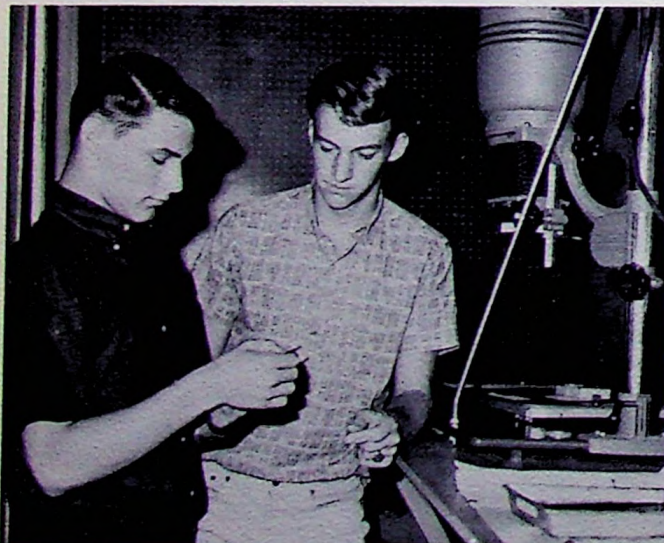

The girls dressed in corduroy outfits of green jumpers over bright gold dresses and flashed their green-and-gold pompons.



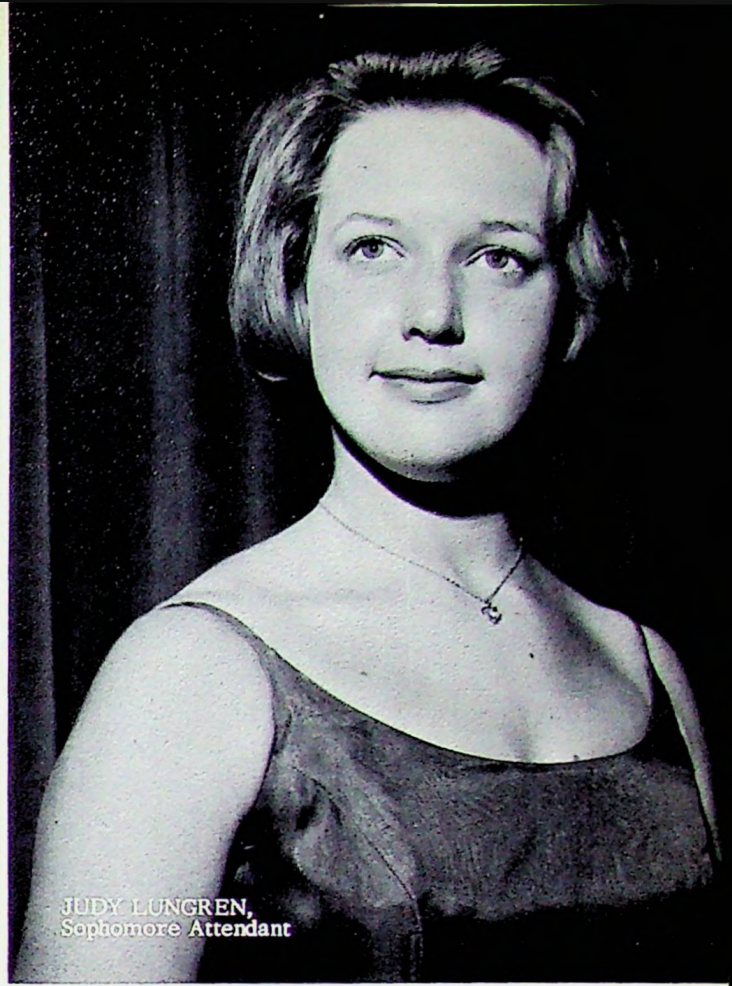

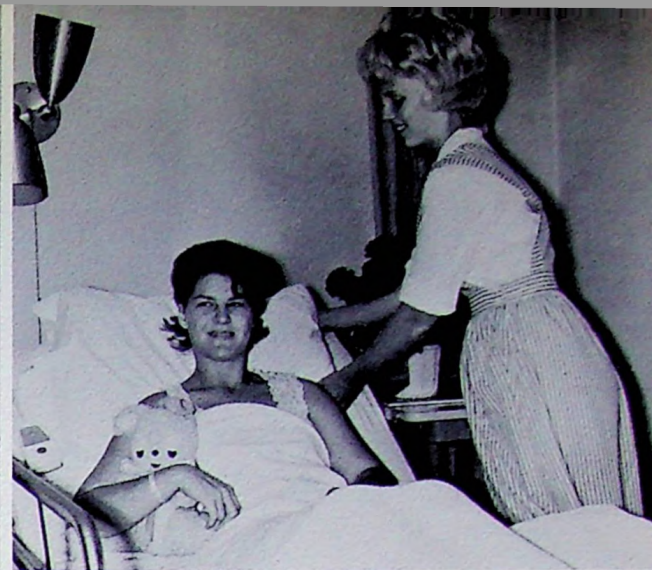
